Cobblestone House filling up, Pipestone Villas has waiting list **Both properties seeing people** moving to Moosomin to live there

It's been a year since Cobblestone House opened its doors in Moosomin, and things opened its doors in Moosomin, and things are running smoothly in the long-term care, assisted living, and independent living facility. Currently there are only eight of Cobblestone's 42 units left, while Pipestone Villas—the two buildings that offer 48 units of 50-plus independent living right next to Cobblestone House as part of the same development—are new 100 per cent full with velopment—are now 100 per cent full with a waiting list.

"I think for the most part, everybody's really happy and enjoying the things we have going on here every day, and the community. The small community that we have here is good," said Amber Hintz, Nurse Administrator at Cobblestone House. "Once they come here, they can move in as an in-dependent and live independently, and as their care needs change or flex or go up and down, they can always stay here and move

to assisted living or long-term care."

The 42-unit facility is located by the Pipestone Villas, and the two entities share a unique relationship.

"Cobblestone has been wonderful be-

cause I know some of my residents have needed care for awhile, but didn't want to go to the nursing home or go down the road to another care home," said Bernie Nos-terud, Property Manager at Pipestone Villas. "We tried as best we could to get home care and other private services to them so they could stay here."

There are 24 suites in each of the Gemstone and Sandstone buildings at Pipestone Villas, and Nosterud says all 48 units are

villas, and Nosterud says all 46 units are currently spoken for.

"We do have people signing up on our wait list quite regularly now," she said. "So it's a good idea if people think that this is where they want to be to put their name down on the wait list."

The corresponded to the building the facilities.

The general idea in building the facilities so close together was to allow for a smooth transition of care as needs change without residents needing to leave the communities

they are already a part of.
"We have quite a few residents that used to live at the villas that have moved in here," Hintz said. "And then we have some family members that live at the villas that have their mothers or fathers or others they know either living here or interested in liv-ing here because their children live at the

Some residents of the villas also drop by Cobblestone to visit and join in activities, making for a wider community between the three properties.

"We actually have a guest suite here at Cobblestone that people can rent out for a night or a week or whatever it might be, and that guest suite is open to any family

members who have people coming to visit who live in Cobblestone or in either of the villas," Hintz explained.

Nosterud summed up the symbiotic relationship between Pipestone Villas and Cob-blestone House best, referring to the entities as siblings.

We consider ourselves sisters, because whoever we have here that needs to be there, it's in their best interest to go to Cob-blestone because we're independent living, so we don't do all the services that Cobble-stone does," she said. "What's really nice about having Cobblestone right next door now is if the residents of the villas need the services, they can go over there. But, from what I understand, they're filling up quite quickly, too, so it's been good.

Younger demographic

moving in

One trend Nosterud has noticed lately is a younger demographic moving in to the Pipestone Villas.

"We actually have a younger demo-

graphic moving in now, they're not waiting until they're 80 or 90 to come in," she said. They're coming in their 70s so they'll be here a lot longer.

Gemstone and Sandstone are independent living with large suites—and no maintenance like grass to mow or snow to

shovel. Another definite plus that Nosterud noted was for people who travel not having to worry about their property "because you just turn the key and leave here.

"We've been lucky to move the residents that needed to move," Nosterud said. "We moved them to Cobblestone and had peo-ple that were ready to move into the suites that were just vacated, so now we're 100 per cent full."

Properties attracting people from outside the area

Another trend both places have noticed is that of residents moving in from outside the Moosomin area; folks with some tie to Moo-

mossomin area, roles with some act of woo-somin, but who are new to town. "It's not just a local, it's from the cities," Nosterud said. "They're moving from Regi-na, just coming in because maybe they have family here and they want to be closer, but

Hintz says she is seeing the same town."

Hintz says she is seeing the same, listing a few of the places outside of Moosomin where residents of Cobblestone hail from.

"We've got Redvers, we've had Langen-burg, we've had Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Ro-canville, which I would still consider this community, but lots from other areas that move here for multiple reasons," she said.

Both Hintz and Nosterud noted the re-cent general boom that Moosomin has been experiencing has been a large part of that

One myth Hintz would like to see dispelled is that facilities like Cobblestone House are expensive, and may be out of fi-

nancial reach for many people.
"One thing that I know that we do struggle with in our community is just the misconception that it's too expensive to live here, which is absolutely not the case," she said. "If you sit down and actually do the

house, if people broke it down as to what their insurance costs are, maybe they don't have a mortgage, but what the upkeep of their home is and all of that kind of stuff— their groceries and their transportation or gas—all that. If they figured out what the cost is to stay where they are at, they would probably see how affordable it is to live here. Then on top of that, you get the com-munity that we have built here—more like a family, actually-so there's definitely more benefits than I think meets the eye.

With Cobblestone House filling up, staffing needs have increased as capacity levels near the top. In fact, Hintz says they're actively pursuing relief nurses and volunteers at Cobblestone right now.

Ultimately, the end result of all the work

is the experience of residents, and Hintz was quick to tell of the adventure those that call Cobblestone home embark on.
"We use the Dial a Van regularly and get

them out," she said. "Yesterday, they were

out at the coffee at the Legion, and we take them for ice cream, we take them down to Tim Hortons to decorate smile cookies, and we try and get them out into the commu-nity as much as we can."

Cobblestone also invites the community into their home as well for events such as live music, and the spring and fall bazaars.

Doors open at detox centre on Kahkewistahaw First Nation

Ribbon cutting ceremony held at Eagle Sky Healing Lodge

"The elders tell us that when you see someone who has addictions—someone that's hurting and that's in pain—they are our teachers. They have a special place in God's heart. They have a special place in God's kingdom which is why we're told, 'be careful how what you think of people', because as First Nations, we come from an equalitarian society where everybody was equal," said Elder Ross Cadotte during a prayer offering outside the Eagle Sky Healing Lodge.

The 10-bed detox centre officially opened on the Kah-kewistahaw First Nation on Sept. 27. The centre is a safe and secure place for people on their healing journey, offering cultural, spiritual, and mental health supports in addition to a beliefic treatment program. Paleting curports addition to a holistic treatment program. Relative support staff and security follow the Seven Grandfather Teachings in helping people between the ages of 18 and 25 in the co-ed facility.

It's been some time in the making with the Yorkton Tribal Council first announcing plans to base the centre in the former health building on Kahkewistahaw back in early March.

"We negotiated the lease for the facility here, but they came over and above the lease requirements on what we needed," said Ivan Cote, Health Director with the YTC on working with the Kahkewistahaw Chief and Council. "They were more than willing to help us, and we do appreciate that because of their help and their assistance in requiding to the facility." providing us this facility."

Doubling the number of beds at Eagle Sky Healing

Lodge is the next step, something still in discussions, ac

cording to Cote.

"We're starting at the facility with 10 beds, and it's our intention to expand to 20 beds with the approval of the funding from the province," he said. "We take this as a very serious and positive step, because as we speak right now, there are funerals back home for people who have passed away from overdose. It's a small step to us, but it's a big step when it comes down to our fight against the

addictions and saving our people."
There is a waitlist for Eagle Sky Healing Lodge, which will be admitting people effective Oct. 7. Manager Danita Benjoe credited staff members, calling them 'family,' and explained their approach to helping clients through their healing journey. "All you need is your heart and compassion and that empathy and that love to our relatives," she said. "That's what we'll be showing here when our relatives come through our doors. It's going to be like a home for them." Assembling the right people on the team at Eagle Sky was quite a challenge, as Benjoe recalled. "It was April when I stepped in here and there was only two of us—I and my janitor! It was a difficult task in recruiting and getting this place up and running," she said. "I took it many times to cremony, and I had my staff

said. "I took it many times to ceremony, and I had my staff come my way. I just want to give thanks to our Creator, for allowing us to come together and for bringing this detox centre together.

Having just the right type of people in a detox centre is crucial, something program consultant Cliff Bird noted. "I've always said the frontline workers are my heroes," he said. "They're the ones that bring their 'A' game every day, not knowing what they're going to be faced with. At times, they're going to face the brunt of folks that are coming off addictions, folks that are in horrific withdrawal, they have to face it all.'

Helping 10 at a time

Back in April, the province announced their Action Plan for Mental Health and Addictions, which included the commitment of adding 500 addictions treatment spaces across Saskatchewan. At that point, 183 spaces had been officially announced in Lloydminster (15), Estevan (26), Saska-toon (32), and 36 virtual spaces through EHN Canada. More spaces are needed, but Kahkewistahaw Chief Evan Taypotat

but Kahkewistahaw Chiet Evan Taypotat sees the work before the Eagle Sky Healing Lodge as a path to sovereignty.

"As we settle our claims, as we build hotels and gas stations and other things, somewhere in there we forget to mention the people that need our help," he said. "When I think about this beautiful Eagle Sky Healing Lodge—10 beds 10 people at Sky Healing Lodge—10 beds, 10 people at a time we're going to heal, that has to be in

the word sovereignty as well. We have to help fix those people that want our help." He also addressed security concerns that may be associated with addiction and those battling it, noting that the local Community Safety Partol will have an in-

Community Safety Patrol will have an increased presence near the facility.

"We talked about it in the pipe ceremony this morning, where we said, 'the people that are coming to the First Nation are coming with problems, coming with baggage'," Chief Taypotat explained. "We need to make sure that the good hearts embrace those people the minute they walk in the door and fill them with love, because they're coming from places with hate, First Nations with hate, homes with hate. I'm really excited to see what the good hearts do for our community. good hearts do for our community.
"I wish we could ask Chief Kahkewis-

tahaw, 'are we making you proud? Are we doing what your vision was 150 years ago when you signed Treaty Four'?" Chief Taypotat continued. "This building alone, I know Chief Kahkewistahaw when he hears us today, I know he's proud of us, so that makes me really happy to know that he's within earshot. His spirit's here, and he's going to watch over these people as they come to our community for healing."

Taypotat called hosting the new centre on their land 'an honour,' giving his well

on their land an nonour, giving his well wishes to the staff.

"We will do anything and everything for the people that come up with solutions," he said. "This is a solution, and we are at your beck and call. We will find the money. We will find a way, because sovereignty involves healthy people, and we

Stark reality of addiction

Drug toxicity deaths set a provincial record in 2023 with 484 (291 confirmed, 193 suspected) people in Saskatchewan having died from drugs. Some of this rise has been linked with more fentanyl, xylazine, and benzodiazepines entering the overall

drug supply.

During the opening at Eagle Sky Healing Lodge, Bird spoke of the explosion of crystal methamphetamine that his home community of Montreal Lake Cree Nation faced seven years ago—including six re-cent unsolved murders in the community

linked to drugs.
"We recently had a young man that was beaten to death and his body burned over \$35 worth of meth," Bird said. "Crystal meth deaths among our young people are going to rival everything our nations have faced. Folks, if we are afraid of a time when we will begin to lose an entire generation—or a big portion of a generation to crystal meth and these drugs, I want to say, ladies and gentlemen, that train has say, ladies and left the station.

Bird foresees the Eagle Sky Healing Lodge to be an extremely busy facility and a crucial component in healing from ad-

"Initially, I would suggest that you keep your doors open for your local people, but I guarantee within the next three to six months, they will literally be kicking your door down to get in from all communities,

door down to get in from all communities, all people groups, they're going to have our white brothers come as well, because they're in huge trouble," he said.

FSIN Vice Chief David Pratt also stressed the importance of healing, asking for a show of hands in the crowd of around 150 who "has a loved one that's bettling activing right your clear. about 150 wild has a loved one that's battling active addiction right now or lost a loved one." Nearly every hand shot up in the crowd.

However, given the dark statistics, Pratt also spoke of the immense hope and opportunity to heal.

"That's the message we have to give to

our people: there is hope for them," he said. "They're struggling because of trauma, things that happened, but we're still

dealing with that ripple effect from the residential schools. What are our grandparents and our great-grandparents and our parents went through, and what some of us went through, that trauma that they carry, it's still within us and we're all on that healing journey—every one of us— and we're all at different levels. I want to encourage you, don't give up on our people. Love them. That's the thing that's going to make the difference.

He also addressed the Eagle Sky Healing Lodge staff, reminding them to also

ing Lodge staft, reminding them to also take time for themselves.

"We have so many losses that we carry in our own families, but we work so much, we just keep going," Pratt said. "We don't have time to properly grieve and take care of ourselves. So I want to encourage the leadership and the frontline workers, take that time for yourself. Take care of your. that time for yourself. Take care of yourself. It's important whichever way you have to use whether it's through church or through ceremony, get that spiritual help that you need. It's okay. The world will not end if you turn your phone off for one

More hope for the future

Ochapowace First Nation Chief Shelly Bear called the opioid crisis one of the toughest we've ever had, noting that it's not just youth being affected, but people

"As leaders, the battles that we face standing beside our people are pretty tough, and addictions and the opioid crisis

that we're living in is one of the toughest that we've had," she said. But Chief Bear had something very important to share with those in attendance—Ochapowace will soon be home to a treatment facility.

"We've chosen our site, we've actually been granted 20 beds for Ochapowace to build a treatment centre on our nation," she said, adding that there is a site in mind south of Broadview. The challenge before project organizers is in the financial supprott—Chief Bear explained that money from the provincial government will come once the treatment facility is constructed.

"So that's the dilemma we're in right now," she said.

The reason treatment centres are so important—especially in close proximity to detox facilities—comes through the prodetox facilities—comes inrough the pro-cess of healing. Once people withdraw from drugs and alcohol, the next step in their journey is an outpatient rehabilita-tion program. It is here that people learn how to reclaim their life after active addic-tion and reintervrate into society.

tion and reintegrate into society. YTC Tribal Chief Isabel O'Soup shared about one young man she knew who was on the verge of being named a dangerous offender, but had the opportunity to enter treatment. As a result, the man turned his life around "and is living a good life" with

"When I see him, I see hope," Chief O'Soup said. "I see hope for First Nation people."

She also spoke of how healing is not a quick process, but it is also one people can embark on.

"We just need to deal with what's inthis," said Chief O'Soup. "T tell everybody that we took 150 years, probably, to get the way that we were from all our historical traumas, and we might take 150 years to get to where we want to be, but we're getting there now. Our focus is to keep it small, so you don't get overwhelmed one person at a time.

For the past few weeks in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth there have been a number of community meetings. The meetings were carried out by a Winnipeg consulting firm called Govfox Municipal Consulting

consulting firm called Govfox Municipal Consulting Inc. The meetings were led by company owner Cheryl Christian and the company's specializes in developing specialized municipal services and solutions.

The recent Elkhorn meeting brought out a crowd who learned what strategic planning was all about and how it might or could affect them. During the presentation Christian stressed that all communities need a future worth all the security their court their carriers. growth plan to ensure their continued growth and community development which will ensure a positive qual-

One of the first points of business was to ensure some members of the audience that another community growth program, known as 20-50, was not their mandate growth program, known as 20-30, was not their mandate or program as apparently this program has met with some push-back. She continued by asking the audience for feedback on a number of community-related issues they might be facing. Her question was, "What do you want in your community now and in the future?" She pointed out that all communities need a future growth

plan and can not leave it to chance or outside forces.

"Your plan must include the best use of your community resources to benefit you the most," she said. "Do you have a core of future leaders in the community that you have a core of triture to lead you? We must also realize that in a community development plan, one size does not fit all. A community must ensure that it includes all age groups in any future planning. You must ask the question—how do we market our strong and weak points to develop the community? We must identify four

points to develop the community? We must identify four key points in order for our area to grow and develop. We must be aware of our strengths, our weaknesses, our opportunities, and any future or present threats in our community to future development plans."

The response from the crowd covered a wide range of concerns. These included new and necessary businesses, local medical services, the loss of the community's young people, better roads, good schools, jobs in the area, affordable housing, recreational facilities and the need for affordable seniors housing and apartments to keep seniors in the community.

keep seniors in the community.

Some people present gave personal examples of local government programs and services that they felt were inept. She went on to say that in any strategic planning

program you need people to step up to lead, but sadly too many do not get involved in the process by offering suggestions and realistic solutions when needed.


