A few things will look different this winret due to Covid-19. Curl Canada released new rules for return to play. The main changes include the following to help with 2 meter (6 feet) distancing on ice:

One sweeper only on all delivered stones. No relaying (second sweeper tak-ing over halfway down the sheet)

# Giving back to the community in more ways than one!

Moosomin Thrift Store and Food Share is all about giving back to our com-munity. As a non-profit organization, we strive in helping others, not only in Moosomin, but also in the surrounding areas.

The success of both the thrift store and the food share relies on the com-munity and donations. Everything from clothing to housewares to miscellaneous items that are sold at the thrift store are items that were donated. In return the money collected from the sales for the donated goods are put back into the store to keep it functioning and to pay for some of the food products that go into the food hampers, such as milk, bread

and eggs.

Our mission when we first started was to eventually be able to give back to our community and to organizations in need. In addition to our donations to the Kin-Ability, The Legion, and Playfair Daycare, we have made donations to MOTOH, Moosomin and District Music Festival and

DQ's Hospital Week.

Now going on in our third year at our new location at 609 Gordon Street, we are grateful for continued donations and patronage. We live in such a caring community. We regularly receive donations for both the thrift store and the food share. Over the past year we have also been

fortunate to receive a few large monetary donations,

for which we are grateful.

The Moosomin Thrift
Store relies on volunteers and we would like to send our sincere appreciation and thank you to all of our volunteers who spend countless hours sorting, pricing, and putting away items. Becoming a volun-teer is a great way to support your community and give back, and we always welcome new recruits. It's a simple process of contact-ing our administration and filling out an application

form. Unfortunately we were

unable to receive the gar-den grant due to Covid-19, which had been a work which had been a work in progress but has been so successful the past few years. We were able to succeed at getting a grant through Food Banks Canada which helped us purchase another freeze for chase another freezer for our food share which will be so helpful, especially when we are able to get food grants from other or-ganizations which often comes in frozen goods. Any produce people have donated has first been put into our clients' hampers and if there was any left it had been sold at our store

to our customers for a reasonable price. The proceeds from produce goes straight back to the food bank to pay for milk, eggs, bread, and other groceries we may need.

As this year has been lot of unknowns, and we did have to close our doors for a little bit due to the pandemic, we are extremely thankful to be back open, even at reduced hours. When we opened back up, we welcomed Kadence Meredith and Jaedyn Moore on our staff for the summer. Now into fall, our full-time administrator Samantha Campbell is back and Kadence and Jaedyn have stayed on as part time. Even though we have

reduced hours, we are still as busy as ever! Currently we are open from Monday to Thursday, 12 pm - 5 pm for retail shopping only. And our biggest news as of yet is our new debit/credit card machine! We are now able to accept cards but we do have a minimum pur-

do have a minimum purchase price of \$10.

On Fridays we are closed for retail shopping but are open from 12 pm -5 pm for donation drop off. If you were thinking about donating, whether it be towards the thrift store or to the food share, please drop off your donations when the store is taking donations on Fridays only from 12–5

pm at the side door.

Another item we need that people tend to forget are monetary donations to keep the building running and to pay for building maintenance as it occurs. # **Moosomin Baptist Church**

# We are open and offering Covid-safe programming

Covid-19 may have thrown a wrench into many things, but the Moosomin Baptist Church wants the community to know that they are open and forging ahead with regular programming with Covid precau-

"We want people to know that we are still there, and we are open," says Pastor Jonathon Shierman. "We are hearing a lot Johanni Shirian. We are hearing a for from people that they didn't realize we were running programs again. We have kids programming on Wednesdays and youth programs on Fridays. We are there Sunday mornings with full kids program-

#### The importance of programming

"We are one of the few churches in the ea that has kids programming—a lot of area that has kids programmingarea that has kids programming—a lot of kids programming. It's just something that people seem to be looking for and don't seem to know we have," he adds. "There is not a lot remaining for kids program-ming outside of churches—there is not a ton happening right now.
"Of course, it is all very Covid safe. We

"Of course, it is all very Covid safe. We are following the province's rules."

Shierman says the church is following the same rules as day camps.
"The province told us to follow the day camp rules," he says. "So we are keeping them in groups of 15, everybody is socially distanced within those groups, we are

keeping soft-touch surfaces down, there is lots of cleaning. The kids don't sing in our church service or wear masks if they

obit children service of wear masks it they do sing."

Shierman says they are distancing for their regular church services as well, which are being held every Sunday at 10:30 am.

"We are using every other pew, and we are two meters apart. We are trying to encourage people to RSVP ahead of time on our website, but they don't have to. We keep attendance. We are trying to limit the congregating inside, and encouraging one-way traffic," he says.

He says he feels it's important to continue to effect the says he feels it's important to continue to effect the says.

He says he feels it's important to continue to offer programming through Covid-19, especially to the children.

"Obviously, as a Pastor, I want to see Biblical teaching and I want to see kids brought up in Biblical truth," he says. "It is also really nice for kids to have a safe place where they can go. Most of our programming is free, or very close to free, and for young parents and young children, that is a rarity. For example, our Kidz Club program Wednesday nights is \$30 a year, which is very neeligible. but it provides which is very negligible, but it provides an hour and a half of programming every Wednesday night, and I don't know where else you would find that, where they get skits and games and snacks and things like that, so that kind of setting, I think, is really valuable.

"We talk about kids like they are the future of the church, and I say 'no, they are the *now* of the church.' Because if the kids were the future of the church and the adults were the now of the church, if this weren't for the kids, there are way more efficient, easier ways to do what we are doing if it's just about adults. We want to make sure that kids are the focus.

"So, for parents to have an hour and a

half to themselves where they know that they have safe programming for their kids, where everyone is criminal-record checked, and where they know there are Covid precautions taking place, and they can do that for fairly low-cost, that is hopefully a service to them!



Some changes at the church, and more coming in the future Shierman also points out that, while Covid-19 has slowed down some of their plans, there are some changes that have taken place at the church. He is one of those changes.

"We have all new staff," he says. "I am fairly new, and Elesha (our office adminis-

fairly new, and Elesha (our office adminis-trator) just started two months ago.

"I started officially May 1st—my family and I moved April 15, right at the height of the lockdown from Calgary.

Shierman says it was tough starting as a new pastor during a pandemic, but it also allowed the church some time to review what it could change and gave it a chance

to "rebrand" itself.

"As of right now, not a ton is different," sys Shierman. "People will find a new logo, they will find some new branding because we have been able to work on that behind the scenes stuff, especially when we were closed down. The biggest change they will notice is me being there. The pre-vious pastor was there for 19 years and then they went out a hired a fairly young pastor, so that's a big change as it is. But the rest of the stuff, if they have been there before, will feel very similar. We still have the same worship teams, the same style of service, the same children's programming.

"We are hoping to be able to offer more post-Covid, but we are kind of in that waiting game right now. Because the world is so different than it was six months ago, I have tried intentionally to keep as much familiar as we can in the meantime.

"We really view this as a new era within

the church. When the previous pastor left, the interim time before I came, the church spent a lot of time trying to figure out who we are as a church and where we want to go, spending some time figuring out their

identity and direction. So we felt like it was a good opportunity, a nice turning of the page, to start fresh. It's not to say the church is ignoring who we have been or what we have done, it is just taking stock of everything and being intentional about

Shierman says anyone wanting more information about the Moosmin Baptist Church is welcome to stop by and see

Elesha at the office to find out more about what they do. He says anyone is welcome to join in on their programs, regardless of if they are a member of Moosomin Baptist

Church.

"If people want to stop by and see Elesha, she has got the greatest tea collection I have ever seen in the world," says Shierman. "Come for some tea with Elesha, we would love that!"

# **Lower Souris Watershed Committee assists in delivery** of the Farm and Ranch Water Infrastructure Program

The Lower Souris Watershed Committee assists in the delivery of the Farm and Ranch Water Infrastructure Program in the Lower Souris Watershed. The Farm and Ranch Water Infrastructure Program (FRWIP) is part of the Environmental Sus-(FKWIP) is part of the Environmental Sus-tainability and Climate Change initiatives through the Canadian Agricultural Part-nership (CAP). This program is designed to support the development of secure and sustainable water sources for agricultural use in Saskatchewan, mitigate the impact of drought and improve public safety, and reduce potential groundwater conteminareduce potential groundwater contamina-tion through well decommissioning. Staff with the Lower Souris Watershed

work directly with landowners and mu-nicipalities to access cost share funding to develop new water sources for livestock watering, crop spraying and other agricultural purposes and also to decommission abandoned water wells to reduce potential groundwater contamination in our water-shed. Staff assist in determining eligibility for the program, provide technical assistance, prepare and submit project applications, and more.

There are two program streams available—the Dugout, Well and Pipeline rebate and the Pre-approval Stream for well decommissioning projects and other special projects.

The Dugout, Well and Pipeline rebate stream can provide 50% cost-share funding for projects such as new dugouts or dugout expansion (of at least 1/3 size increase), the development of large or small diameter wells, and the installation of deep or shallow buried pipelines. Producdeep or shallow buried pipelines. Producers can also apply for remote watering systems, watering bowls, storage tanks and fencing as add-ons to a new water development project. This funding is available to agricultural producers who earn at least \$50,000 gross farm income in Saskatchewan, are at least 18 years old, and have an agricultural use for the water. A premises ID number is required for livestock operations and projects must comply with requires tions and projects must comply with regulatory requirements.

latory requirements.

The Pre-Approval - Well Decommissioning stream provides 90% cost-share funding to decommission abandoned water wells for landowners and municipalities. Lower Souris Watershed staff is panities. Lower Souris watershed stall is available to assist in finding knowledge-able contractors to properly measure the wells to determine materials needed and assist with the application process. There are hundreds of these abandoned water are hundreds of these abandoned water wells in our watershed. It is important to decommission them properly to reduce risk of groundwater contamination, to reduce safety risks to people, animals and machinery, and to reduce liability.

The Pre-Approval - Special Projects stream is for water development projects that are considered to have a high public benefit such as community well development by rural municipalities or First Nament by First Nament

ment by rural municipalities or First Na-tions. An agricultural use for the water is required such as crop spraying, livestock watering, use in value-added agricultural processing or greenhouse production.

Watershed staff have worked with many producers and municipalities in our watershed to access this program and develop new wells, pipelines, dugouts, remote watering systems, and watering bowls, and to decommission abandoned wells. We look forward to meeting with producers to discuss potential projects and provide assistance. If you are interested, please call Karmen at 306-452-7953.

# The 802 Pipestone Air Cadets

# **Teaching youth how to** become productive and positive leaders and citizens

The Moosomin 802 Royal Canadian Air Cadet Pipestone Squadron is a youth program that has operated in the Moosomin area since forming in 1971. The cadet program is open to all youth in the area between the ages of 12 years to 18 years of age, with no fees. New cadets are welcome at any time of the year and there is no set registration deadline.

The cadet program is a collaboration be-

tween the Air Cadet League of Canada and Department of National Defense, with the main goals of the program focusing on the promotion of positive citizenship, leader-ship and fostering an interest in the mili-

Cadets meet every Monday throughout the school year at the Moosomin Convention Centre. During the weekly sessions, cadets will learn about the fundamentals of flight, survival skills, how to maintain care of their uniforms, marksmanship, and learn about the Canadian Armed Forces and the roles they play internationally, just to mention a brief few of the topics covered. During the training year the cadets will also get to experience survival campouts, gliding, and participation in Remembrance Day ceremonies, drill, marksmanship and

effective speaking competitions, as well as visiting various military institutions.

With all the activities that the squadron

performs throughout the year, the biggest draw to the program continues to be the ability for cadets to earn either their gliders

ability for cadets to earn either their gliders pilot license or their power aircraft license at no cost to the cadet. Over the course of the last 10 years, 802 Pipestone Air Cadets have graduated seven pilots.

Cadets through hard work have the ability to earn their glider's license at 15 years of age and 16 years of age for their private pilot's license. If cadets choose not to pursue their pilots license, the cadet program has many more summer courses that can be taken such as survival instructor, adbe taken such as survival instructor, ad-

be taken such as survival instructor, advanced aviation, leadership and ceremonial instructor, physical fitness instructors, basic survival, and general training.
"One of the most rewarding aspects of this program is watching the cadets mature and become strong independent individuals," says Capt. Dennis Youngblut. "This is one of the few programs that I know of where youth are encouraged to take charge. where youth are encouraged to take charge and teach their peers. Our program teaches youth how to become productive and positive leaders and citizens."

# **Tri Valley Trails Snowmobile Club**

# New members and volunteers are needed

Every winter a group of dedicated volunteers maintains hundreds of miles of snowmobile trails from Fleming to Spy Hill, ensuring local snowmobilers have a

safe and scenic ride. Tri Valley Trails is a local snowmobile club providing safe, groomed trails for riders. The club is also affiliated with Saskatchewan Snowmobile Association (SSA). Since TVT formed 18 years ago it has maintained several miles of trail sysnas maintained several miles of trail systems which connect three valleys—the Qu'Appelle, Assiniboine, and the Pipestone. The trail system also joins up with the SnoMan trails (Manitoba system). However we have not run our trail to St. Lazare due to the floods and the washing out of the bridge crossing the Qu'Appelle

The Tri Valley Trials are designated SSA trails, therefore trail users are required to

register their snowmobile.

The club currently maintains 300 kilometres of trail in the Moosomin, Fleming, Rocanville, Welwyn, Tantallon and Spy Hill areas. There are three groomer operators who spend hours grooming the trails each winter, plus a number of volunteers who go out onto the trails at the beginning of the season to stake signs along the trails.

While there are young members and new members who use the trails each year, Tri Valley Trails is looking for people to serve on the board or as volunteers. There are about 10 committee members currently doing much of the work with Tri Valley Trails, and the club is hoping more

young members who are passionate about snomobiling get involved. There is good cause to join the club.

One challenge is finding volunteers to install the signage along the trail each year—a large Job, but one that ensures sledders ride safely all winter. The trails provides 300 kilometres of trails for riders and it's a safer way to ride. However ers and it's a safer way to ride. However the club has not been able to maintain all of the trails the last few years as we do not have the help for the signing and trail maintenance. Signing trails is a big part of the trail system, and SSA provides an online training course so anyone can sign up to take it. 
When you buy a membership, you are also helping your local club out. Signage is expensive; grooming involves both fuel and repair costs. The club also has insurance expenses which includes insuring the warm-up shacks. These shacks are available to everyone. Every time a rider pur-chases a membership with the club, that money goes back to the club to help cover

the costs of maintaining the trails.

In 1929 the Saskatchewan Fish & Game Protective Association was formed through the initiative of three individu-als, Mr. Judge Bence and Mr. Tom Coburn from North Battleford and Mr. Stan Naden from Regina. They recognized the need for a united provincial voice for Saskatch-ewan's anglers and hunters to protect our unparalleled natural resources

On February 1, 1932 at a meeting of the organization, the name was changed to the Saskatchewan Fish & Game League, and by 1934 boasted 14 branches with 839 members who paid a membership fee of

Due to the League's expanding scope and activities, the name was changed in 1966 to The Saskatchewan Wildlife Federation and finally was registered as a non-profit organization in 1982 as Saskatch-ewan Wildlife Federation.

In 1968, the Federation adopted the whooping crane, a species that was clawing its way back from the brink of extinction, as its official emblem.

Operation Respect - Program provides signs to the landowner that are designed to encourage the hunter to "Respect the Landowner's Rights - Ask Permission to Hunt."

Wildlife Tomorrow - To preserve habitat in its natural state for all species of wildlife

Habitat Trust - Habitat Trust is a special fund established in 1978 for the purchase, retention, and enhancement of critical wildlife habitat across the province

Youth - A "Wonders of Wildlife" Manual has been developed, with the co-operation of other programs and conservation groups.

Fisheries - S.W.F. branches conduct local fisheries projects (fish stocking, stream enhancement, trout ponds, etc.) throughout the province in conjunction with the provincial governments Fish & Wildlife Development Fund. With assistance from biologists, the branches are the main force behind securing much of Saskatchewan's fisheries habitat.

Habitat Enhancement - Over one million trees have been planted on cuftivated parcels of wildlife land throughout the province to provide food and shelter for wildlife
