2024 Harvest of Hope raises \$65,000

\$12,000 donated to Moosomin Food Bank, \$4,250 donated to Rocanville Food Bank

Moosomin's Harvest of Hope has raised a total of \$65,000 this year, with \$12,000 being donated to the Moosomin Food Share last week, \$4,250 going to the Rocanville Food Bank, and the remaining \$48,750 going to the Canadi

This brings the project total to over \$700,000 over the

last II years. Harvest of Hope is a local growing project located between Moosomin and Rocanville that harvests a crop every year for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank as a way to end food insecurity.

"Locally what we do is we grow a crop, we sell it, and the proceeds of that crop are sent to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, or given directly to the local food banks," said Kyle Penner who helps organize the growing project each year.

"Locally the food banks use the money for groceries,

which is directly feeding people. Overseas the proceeds are distributed through member agencies that are part of the Foodgrains Bank. They will buy food locally, and then distribute it to local populations in those parts of the

world."
Penner says the Moosomin project feeds somewhere between 3,200 and 13,000 people for a month, depending on where the project funds go, and the leveraging that is applied through the Foodgrains Bank.
With the government of Canada's support, the Foodgrains Bank's 15 member agencies are able to leverage donations from individuals, churches and businesses what a ratio of 1.1 for food assistance in the daysloping.

 $_{\rm 50}$ actions from individuals, churches and businesses up to a ratio of 4:1 for food assistance in the developing world.

Penner has been involved with Moosomin's project from the start, along with a group of volunteers who were interested in starting the project.

were interested in starting the project.

"I think that food security is an issue that can be felt anywhere in the world," said Penner. "When you think of people who are hungry, you often think of starving people overseas somewhere. Even locally, there are people who just aren't able to provide for themselves. It's important we help people fulfil their basic needs.

"We like to support the communities where the people who support the project are from. There are people from

who support the project are from. There are people from Moosomin and Rocanville and area that are a part of the Harvest of Hope. It's logical for us to support the local food banks with the proceeds of the project," said Penner.

Penner says everything is paid for with the proceeds from the crop, or donated. "There are no paid employees at Harvest of Hope. Everybody is a volunteer who

volunteers their time, or equipment, fuel, or what-ever they can to make the project go every year," he

In terms of resource, volunteers are the most valuable asset the project

has.
"There are lots of ways that local people volun-teer. We have community members and businesses who donate their equip-ment and time. Farming equipment is expensive to own and operate. There are people like myself and others who donate the time to do administration time to do administration work. There are people who give monetary donations, will donate agricultural products, and many other necessities to help lower our operating costs and maximize the amount of money the project earns. Penner says the community continues to support the

Penner says the community continues to support the project more and more every year.

"There are a few new people interested in helping every year. Obviously many hands make light work.
"It's a project that lots of people have been involved in in different levels over the many years, so continued support is something we're grateful for."

Since starting 11 years ago, the Harvest of Hope has raised a total of \$700,000.

"Food is one of the most basic needs that people have, and it's an important thing to try and take care of if we can. We have been blessed with what we have," said

"The Harvest of Hope project estimates it will feed somewhere between 6,000 to 9,000 people for a month with the donations from 2024."

Samantha Campbell, with the Moosomin Food Share says the donation from Harvest of Hope will buy all of the groceries for the Food Share for the next three months.

"We usually spend anywhere from \$4,000 to \$6,000 on groceries per month, so this will help feed many, many families," said Campbell.

Right now Moosomin Food Share is seeking more do-

"With the Canada Post strike, we are getting very low on monetary donations. A lot of people cannot mail their check. Everything's hard right now, inflation has gone way up, it's harder for people to donate, so if they are able to, we really appreciate that," said Campbell.

Multiple roles in new government

I have many roles in the new government:

- I serve as **Deputy Government Whip**. Among my duties are tabling answers to written questions from the NDP opposition in the Legislative Assembly, serving as part of the House Leadership team, so my days begin with a House Leaders meeting before the daily Caucus meeting, deciding on the order of speakers on the government side of the house, making sure we always have enough members in the house, amorning absences if a minister or a member. the house, approving absences if a minister or a member has to be away from the Legislative Assembly at any point during the session, and generally herding cats.
- I serve on the Board of Internal Economy. The Board has responsibility for all matters of financial and administrative policy affecting the Legislative Assembly and its members. The board oversees the finances of the Legislative Assembly, its revenues, expenses, assets, and liabilities, the board issues directives governing issues such as MLA expenses and spending, the board oversees independent officers of the Legislature including the Chief Electoral Officer and would approve the Chief Electoral Officer use of any alternate procedure, equipment or technology during a general election. The Board of Internal Economy is responsible for reviewing and approving the budgets for the Legislative Assembly, Service and the Officers of the Legislative Assembly, including the Ombudsman and Public Interest Assembly, including the Obudustinal and Fubic Interest Disclosure Commissioner, the Advocate for Children and Youth, Information and Privacy Commissioner, Chief Electoral Officer, and Conflict of Interest Commissioner and Lobbyist Registrar. For my first meeting of the BOIE, my meeting package filled an entire binder, so that is a very busy committee with a lot on the go!
- I serve on the Cabinet Committee on the Economy. Any decision items that are going to cabinet first go through



this committee. Any issue that could have an economic impact, whether it's coming from Saskatchewan Agriculture, Highways, Trade and Export Development, SaskBuilds and Procurement, or any other ministry, goes to this committee before going to cabinet, and this committee recommends a oerore going to cannet, and ins communite recommends a course of action to cabinet. I have been part of some very in-teresting meetings so far, where ministers and their senior officials come to present a plan or various options along with potential repercussions and the committee hashes out the idea before forwarding a recommendation to cabinet.

I serve on the Standing Committee on the Economy. Unlike the internal Cabinet Committee, this committee includes both government and opposition MLAs and its meetings are public. The Standing Committee on the Economy considers matters relating to the areas of economic development, agriculture, environment, natural resources, rural issues, transportation, and infrastructure. This man-date is accomplished through the examination of legislative proposals, budgetary estimates, annual reports, regulations

and by-laws of professional associations, and by conducting inquiries. We had our first meeting of this committee last week.

- I serve on the Standing Committee on House Services, Is serve on the Standing Committee on House Services, which provides general oversight for all the standing and special committees with respect to membership and the al-location of government departments, agencies and Crown corporations to the various policy committees. In addi-tion, the House Services Committee is responsible for the review of estimates and annual reports of the Legislative Assembly Service and the review of estimates and annual reports of the various officers of the Assembly. Finally, the House Services Committee is authorized to exempts a re-House Services Committee is authorized to examine any rules, procedures, practices, and powers of the Legislative Assembly, its operation and organization, and the facilities and services provided to the Assembly, its committees, and
- I serve on the Caucus Management Committee. This committee is responsible for finances, operation and human resources for the Saskatchewan Party Caucus within the Legislative Assembly, so everything from hiring caucus office staff to setting the annual budget for the caucus office and planning caucus events falls to this committee.

Oilers overly reliant on their two superstars

It's a good-news, bad-news scenario that Edmonton Oilers have the two highest-scoring team-mates in the National Hockey League.

The good news is that Leon Draisaitl and Connor Mc-

David are a threat to score almost every time they're on the ice, but the bad news is that the team's secondary scoring beyond the two superstars is scarce.

Memo to NHL coaches: Figure out a way to stop, or slow down, Draisaitl and McDavid, and you're more than

likely to stop the Oilers.

Recent NHL stats show that while goal production from the top two scorers on each team in the NHL represents, on average, 28.5 per cent of a team's offensive output, the figure is a league-high and unhealthy 40.2 per cent for the

Through the end of November, Draisaitl had 17 goals and McDavid 12. The next-best goal output by an Edmonton forward was four — Ryan Nugent-Hopkins, Corey

The Habs depend heavily on Cole Caufield and Nick Su-

zuki, who provide 36.7 per cent of the team's goals, while the Leafs relied on William Nylander (15) and John Tava-res (11) to lead the offence. The Toronto situation could res (II) to lead the oftence. The Toronto situation could hardly be called dire, though, because high-scoring Auston Matthews missed almost a month due to injury and Toronto's offence is spread out further now that he's back. At the lower end of the statistical story are Anaheim Ducks and Columbus Blue Jackets, whose top two scorers provide a little more than 20 per cent of the team's total. Oilers' general manager Stan Bowman is obviously burning up the phone lines trying to find a dependable scoring forward to add to his roster, because if either Drai-

saitl or McDavid were to be sidelined for any length of time, the Edmonton offence might come close to drying

up.
On the other hand, McDavid and Draisaitl are so prolif-On the other hand, McDavid and Draisaitl are so prolific, that coach Kris Knoblauch gives them an extraordinary amount of ice time, which reduces the chances for lesser players to shine. Anther point in Edmonton's favour is the status of the slumping Zach Hyman, coming off 36- and 54-goal seasons, but with only three in the team's first 20 games. A Hyman breakout can be expected, easing the requirement for the Oilers' big two to carry the heaviest load.

The season isn't half over yet and there's no reason to think the Oilers can't get things going. They started slowly last year, then ran off a 16-game winning streak at one point, and were powerful through the playoffs, losing in Game 7 of the Cup final to Florida.

"It's about bringing a level of urgency ... and doing your job and doing what you need to do and understanding that everybody else is going to go out and do their job," Hyman told NHL.com. "We're not playing up to our

Concerns surrounding illegal foreign ownership of farmland

As Minister of Agriculture, a landowner and cow-calf producer, I personally appreciate concerns surrounding illegal foreign ownership of farmland in Saskatchewan. Ensuring there is no unauthorized foreign land ownership is a top priority for me and the public should be assured the Government of Saskatchewan is committed to protecting Saskatchewan farmland.
Through The Saskatchewan Farm Security Act, the

Farm Land Security Board monitors 40,000 farmland sale transactions annually in the province to ensure purchases

are by either a Canadian or Canadian resident. It can issue exemption orders for non-Canadian-owned entities, typically when in the province's best interest. For example, many agribusinesses in Saskatchewan require an exemption. While the legislation provides enforcement tools regarding entities not in compliance, we are exploring op-

tions to enhance them.

As stated in the recent Auditor's report, no illegal ownership was found in all sale transactions sampled. While the Auditor found that Board staff did not request statutory declarations in nine of the 18 out-of-province corporate transactions, in each of the nine instances the purchasing corporation was Canadian. Most often these

are family corporations and, where this was unclear, a declaration was requested. While declarations may not be mandatory given the numerous tools available to the Board, the Board is now requesting declarations from all out-of-province purchasers. Most of the Auditor's 10 recommendations were already a priority for the Board and implementation has begun.





Kipling food drive brings in 1,700 lbs of food and \$10,000 in donations

Despite a blizzard hitting the area on December 8, a food drive organized by the Kipling Lions, Kipling Fire Department, and Kipling Food Bank has brought in 1,700 pounds of food and raised \$10,000.

This is the first year for the food drive, and the three organizations are now planning to make it an annual event.

"It's still coming in because of
the weather we had, but there
were 1,700 pounds of food and
just under \$10,000 in monetary
donations," said Mike Warner with the Kipling Lions last
Wednesday. "So that was pretty
special. We actually know that
number is going to go up bespecial. We actually know that number is going to go up be-cause there's another person who's supposed to be bringing a couple of thousand dollars more. We'll probably have to update the numbers because we know that there's stuff out there, but the weather was so brutal that

people didn't come.
"It really went well and there were a few things that really amazed me. I got the idea from amazed me. I got the idea from seeing the fireman doing it in the south Okanagan in B.C. and I thought, 'Why can't we bring it to our three groups?' and it worked really well. Everybody got to choose something—the Lions did the promotion and advertising, the food bank did the donation collecting and sorting

and they issued receipts, and the firemen took on going around town to collect food donations.

"We thought that was a big challenge but they actually ac-complished the whole thing and delivered the food in two hours

They split it into four groups with trucks and we called on people to come to the fire hall to meet for orientation before we left that day and I was amazed. That was my apprehension—whether we were going to have anybody be-

cause the weather was bad and you just never know, but we had huge numbers of people and the ages of the people were from seven to into their seventies.

'We put it out to the town and we had lots of younger children show up and they got to ride in the fire trucks and they were the ones who did the running on the streets to get the donations from the houses and bring them back to us. We had cargo trailers fol-lowing behind every fire truck and then we delivered it all to the food bank and unloaded it. It was amazing to see that accomplished in a town of 1,200 people in two hours.

"I thought it would maybe take a little longer, especially when we had that bad weather, and my anticipation was that it was our first try and we didn't know how much we'd bring in, but it way exceeded what we thought. The cash donations are fantastic and

the food donations.
"I asked somebody in the food industry if there is any way that we could kind of figure out the dollar amount for the food, and he said probably around four dollars a pound."

Warner says the food drive will help the Kipling Food Bank get through the Christmas season

and help into the new year.
"The money donations will get them into next year because what happens with the food bank nor-mally is that they're pretty depleted after the Christmas season

so we've got this coming in."

He says he expects the food drive to be an annual event.



"We just think it will build next year and we're planning to do this every year now because it's just something that everybody was involved in. When I talked to the fire chief I said to him, 'You know what amazed me is to see all of your firefighters with big smiles on their faces.'
