## Wawota group headed to Toronto for Meagan's Walk

For the second year, a small group from Wawota is traveling all the way to Toronto to participate in a five kilometre walk in support of pediatric brain tumor research.
The walk, called Meagan's

The Walk, called Meagan's Walk, was founded in memory of Meagan Bebenek, who had a rare form of inoperable brain cancer called a brain stem glioma. She passed away in 2001, and her mother, Denise decided to form a community walk in Meagan's memory that would raise money for the Sick Kids Hospital in To-ronto. The walk grew over the years, and now, thousands of participants get involved and the walk has raised over \$3 million for pediatric cancer research at the hospital.

For Rochelle Friesen of Wa-

wota, Meagan's story is close to her heart, since she also lost her daughter, Cienna, last year to a similar cancer, diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma.

Through an online support group, Friesen spoke with other parents who had lost a child to

parents who had lost a child to this cancer, and learned about Meagan's Walk. "We decided originally when (Cienna) was diagnosed that we would need something to chan-nel energy into, and we did some research into different organiza-tions and this was most specific

research into different organiza-tions, and this was most specific to what she had," Friesen says. The family's doctors referred Cienna to the Sick Kids Hospital in Toronto, and the family took two trips there, and that is where two trips there, and that is where she was diagnosed. Friesen says that the hospital was helpful, and that is what encouraged them to keep supporting the hospital. "It's totally different going to a pediatric hospital than to a normal one. It was friendlier for kids, and they don't seem to have as many pressures to

for kids, and they don't seem to have as many pressures to deal with as many people, so it seemed like they could give you a lot more one on one attention than you might get at other hospitals," Friesen says. "She had her diagnosis, and within a half bour we were already meeting." hour, we were already meeting with the neurooncologist and radiation therapist and the whole team. was a little clown that played with Cienna as well."

Though Cienna received her treatments at home in Saskatchewan, pediatric cancer research happens at the Sick Kids Hospital, and it is the sort of treatment that will help other children in the future who develop this sort of cancer. That is why Friesen felt it would be a good cause to raise

it would be a good cause to raise money for.

Last year was the first year she decided to do the walk, and pledge to raise funds. She formed a walking team, which included herself, her other two kids, her parents, brother and sister and their spouses, and a close familiate the raise. ily friend. They set to raising

money for the walk, which took place in May last year, and that fundraising took various forms. Friesen, and others pledged to donate portions of their pay-cheques to the cause, raise money around the community, and even Friesen's brother, who got married, asked for donations to be made at the wedding instead of

gifts. The largest fundraiser was their Children's Dinner Theatre, which brought in around \$6,500.

"My mom (Nikki Ford) used to organize a community dinner theatre each year, a long time ago. It was an annual adult one. We decided it was time to bring the idea back again, and get some the idea back again, and get some community acts in it. It's geared towards kids, so we do some songs from popular shows they would know," Friesen explains. In total, last year's fundraising raised \$12,000 for the team to donate. The costs to get to Toronto come entirely out of pocket, and not from the funds raised.

Last year's walk was overwhelming and emotional, Friesen says. The walk starts at Fort
York, and proceeds for five kilometres to the Sick Kids Hospital,
where the walkers surround the
entire hospital with their hands clasped, in a big 'hug' around the whole building to show their support for the kids inside bat-

support for the kids inside battling illnesses.
"It's a huge thing. When you
start off, all you can see are people in front of you, and people
behind, and it's pretty cool, when
you're walking through a big city
like that," Friesen says. "The hug
was the most emotional part, and
it thus provided hearter than it was emotional because you know everybody there has been affected in some way, which you don't have as much everywhere, when it's such a rare disease. Just looking up and seeing the little people looking outside the window and taking pictures of us and everything from up there, that was very emotional and proving."

"It's definitely part of the therapy, because I don't know what we would do if we didn't what we would do it we drant it have something to concentrate on that we thought was maybe going to help," she says. "I don't think I'd be able to do it without think I'd be able to do it without (my family). I need that little extra support, it is what makes it possible, having everyone there for one another."

She adds that going back to the hospital also brings back ther memories with Cienna.

## Opportunities for farmers in some commodities

#### Barley

Feed buyers have picked up their cash bids over the past couple of weeks. Southern Alberta feedlot alley barley quoted as high as \$215 to \$220 a tonne (\$4.70 to \$4.80 a bushel for May delivery). Slower farmer selling due to road bans and spring seed-ing preparation have enhanced prices in the short term. Available stocks are rather snug and the year-end carryout will be

ugit.
Of note though, June delivered bids are showing a 20 cent a bushel discount. Seasonally, feedlots clear out in the late spring and that reduces feed demand.

We have seen prices go as high as \$4.50 a bushel in other areas of southern Alberta and \$4.10 to \$4.20 a bushel in central areas of the province. In Saskatchewan, cash bids are in the \$3.50 to \$3.85 area for April to June movement - better bids as you move west.

Little to nothing changing for the Prairie cash oat market, unfortunately. Logistics remain for the oat industry.

bushel in Manitoba, which is obviously not attracting any interest from growers Saskatchewan elevator bids are notabl Saskatchewan elevator bids are notably worse—\$1.85 to \$2.30 a bushel. But that said, if you are prepared to move away from dealing with the large grain companies, there are special contracting programs through niche merchandisers loaded producer car, with bids as high as \$2.80 to \$2.90 a bushel.

Three million seeded acres, three million tonne production and three million tonnes of demand is the going number base Canada stock levels have been eroding because three-plus million tonnes has been achieved in only two of past six years. With ho-hum wheat pricing, core growers look to retain 2015 oat acreage. The ers look to retain 2015 oat acreage. The problem with price is that the Prairies lack a traditional shift or surprise in demand, like 100,000 tonnes, a demand opportunity that needs a quick fill. So the market continues its lackluster ways.

Further, users in the United States have adjusted to troubles of securing Prairie casts because of transportation issues by

oats because of transportation issues by sourcing more supply from Eastern Cana-da and Scandinavia to ensure an adequate inventory buffer in the Minneapolis cash oat market.

By far the best marketing opportunity lies with those niche marketers mentioned above. Here in Manitoba, despite still weak price offerings from most of the traditional grain companies, if you chose to contract with other players via producer car through shortline rail companies in the

province, cash prices just above \$3 a bush-

el are available for both old and new crop. I think this will remain the most profitable way to go this year on oats.

Flax pricing is starting to ease back a bit. Cash bids around \$14 a bushel are out there for nearby delivery but have faded down to new crop valuation (\$11.50 a bushel) if you look out to deferred delivery periods (June/July). PFCanada wants to be sold out on old crop and move it out quickly.

There has been a slight softening of old

crop bids which suggests Chinese demand is a bit quieter. The bigger question is how much European demand emerges now that the St. Lawrence Seaway has opened

Prices have bounced around a bit over the last couple of weeks, but the declines have been a result of a sizeable quantity of Kazakhstan and Russian flax that over wintered and will now be made available

to the European market, something we

have talked about through the winter.

According to trade ideas, Canadian flax acres will increase for 2015. This could come in as high as two million acres. The unknown is still the size of the Black Sea region's next crop. Flax acreage in Ukraine might be limited, but the Russian crop is forecasted to increase. The largest increase is expected to come from Kazakhstan where currency and credit issues are not as significant.

I have heard talk of new crop cash bids as high as \$12.50 a bushel fall delivered with an Act of God. But I'm having trouble finding such bids these days. It you can get it, use it as an opportunity to at least get something forward priced on expected. 2015 flax production.

# The hype around hormones

The word hormones, when it comes to use in agricul-

ture, creates an emotional response in consumers.

It is quite normal today to turn on the television and see an advertisement where some restaurant, or food brand, is advertising no added hormones. The leap of faith such ads hope the consumer will make is that the food is better than an alternative where hormones have

been given.

Beef is a prime example.

For years many feedlots have used a growth hormone implant which improves economic traits such as average daily gain and feed conversion, to help the facility real-ize a better return.

Animals with the implants generally grow faster, and convert feed better, which of course helps lower the cost

of producing a pound of beef.

It has been a decades-long reality in the industry, which is now being questioned by at least some consum-

Now it needs to be recognized the perception of consumers as to what is and isn't safe might be a somewhat

suspect measure of the true danger.

There were, after all, consumers who balked at the idea of the pasteurization of milk.

And there are consumers today who are backlashing

against the idea of disease immunization protocols, although when I was a mere youngster the idea of there being a vaccination against diseases such as smallpox and tuberculosis was seen as a massive step forward in general health.

So the worry today over beef hormones, or similar on-

farm procedures to produce food more efficiently, seem rather unfounded

Of course it comes down to how the questions of food

Asking a consumer on the street, "Do you feel the burger you purchase at a particular restaurant is safe?" is going to illicit a significantly different reaction than, "Would you prefer beef which has not been treated with added hormones?"

The second question being asked leads one to think that there is a concern over beef from cattle which have had hormone implants. Why else would the question

had hormone implants. Why else would the question even be brought up?

Of course growth hormones are something all animals produce normally, with the levels of production not always being constant.

Dr. Aaron Gibbons recently spoke to the Lethbridge branch of the Alberta Institute of Agrologists. In a Western Producer article on his talk he explained, "Cattle hormones consist of estrogen and a type of testosterone.

. Beef from a steer without implants contains eight nanograms of estrogen per pound—a nanogram is one-

billionth of a gram-while beef from an implanted steer

has 11 nanograms per pound.

"Levels are similar in implanted versus non-implanted heifers. Beef from a pregnant heifer has 700 nanograms

heiters, beet from a pregnant made in the per pound.

"For comparison purposes," he said, "one birth control pill contains 35,000 nanograms of estrogen, which is the equivalent of all the estrogen from 5,500 pounds of

beef from implanted steers."
When you look at such numbers the question which should be asked is why advertising is focusing so much attention on hormones at present?

attention on hormones at present?

The answer, I suppose, is rather obvious. Advertising is as much about creating feelings with consumers as anything else. Your favorite running shoes are selling you an image since, let's face it, the general difference between a \$40 pair and a \$200 pair of sneakers comes down to glitzy ads and \$140 bucks, and not a lot more. Is beef from animals not having had implants tastier? I'd suggest few could tell the difference.

I'd suggest few could tell the difference.

Is it safer?
Well that is the perception being put forward in the

But in the aforementioned story Gibbons said hormones have been used in the livestock industry for 50 years and there are no known ill effects from their use.

years and there are no known in elects from their use. It is a case of consumers being led to a specific conclusion without taking the time to look past the word hormone, which they have begun simply to assume is bad. We should hope the public delves a bit deeper into the science to learn what they eat is still safe.

#### Sask reviewing farmland rules

Saskatchewan's govern-ment will hold further consultations and undertake a review of farmland owner-ship rules under The Saskatchewan Farm Security

Act.
While the review of the Act is underway, regula-tions will be put in place to prohibit certain organi-

zations, like pension plans and other institutional investors, from purchasing farmland in Saskatchewan. The Farm Land Security Board will still retain the Board will still retain the ability to provide exemp-tions for economic devel-opment initiatives, such as those provided in the past for oil and gas develop-

"Saskatchewan farmland is a strategic asset that should be owned by Canadians for the benefit of Canadians," Stewart said. "Our goal is not to limit investment, but to ensure the long-term success of Sas-katchewan's agriculture

industry and economy."

Stewart said the original intent of the Act was to limit ownership of Saskatchewan farmland to Ca-nadian residents and 100 per cent Canadian-owned corporations. However, it did not explicitly define

institutional investors such

institutional investors such as pension plans, administrators of pension fund assets and trusts.

"Recently, the issue has arisen of whether institutional investors like pension plans should be able to purchase Saskatchewan farmland," Stewart said. "There are differing views on this matter, so we want to hear from producers and other interested Saskatchewan residents."



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## Manitoba farmers head to the fields

Manitoba farmers are experiencing a drier spring than usual and that's given them a head start in their fields.

The province experienced a relatively dry winter and spring—so far—and the south-central and southeastern parts of Manitoba, which didn't receive heavy rains last vear, have low subsoil moisture reserves and dry topsoil, says Bruce Burnett, CWB director of weather and market

He adds those regions could use rainfall in the next He adds those regions could use raintain in the next couple weeks; otherwise crop germination issues could arise. But Burnett notes Manitoba is entering a wetter part of the year, and that the transition from April to May "tends to bring some showers along with it." "We'd like to see a general soaking rain in those areas,"

Burnett says. Western Manitoba, however, has plentiful subsoil moisture and it's an issue of soils drying sufficiently to get planting operations underway. Still, this region is in better shape than it's been in recent years thanks to drier than normal conditions over the last four to five months. The problem with last year was during the spring had some extremely heavy rains and they really didn't let

had some extremely heavy rains and they really didn't let up throughout most of the growing season." Burnett says. Farmers there have more reasons to be optimistic this year than in recent ones: "It looks like we're going to have a reasonable chance to get some of these areas dried out enough that [farmers] can get onto the fields and plant." Some seeding is already underway in Manitoba, and if weather forecasts are realized, next week should see more

general planting activity in those drier areas of south-central and southeastern Manitoba, says Burnett. That would

be significantly ahead of last year, when widespread seed-ing progress didn't begin until the second week of May. But Manitoba Agriculture's cereal crops specialist Pa-mela de Rocquigny notes planting early heightens the

risk of cold temperatures causing crop injury.

"If the crop that's being seeded emerges and we see cold enough temperatures, we could see some crop in-

jury and that could impact stand establishment and crop

Burnett, however, adds that early season crops like peas

and wheat can withstand a bit of frost.

The advantage of planting early is it favours higher yields, de Rocquigny says.

Earlier seeding allows crops to flower sooner and there-

by be less vulnerable to damaging hot temperatures that occur in July and August. Also, crops are more advanced and better able to withstand possible yield losses from insects that can blow in later in the season, she says

## Grain companies investing in supply chain

Grain companies have been making multi-million dollar investments to im-prove the supply chain in Western Canada and they wouldn't mind if the rail-

ways followed suit.
The presidents of Viterra
and Richardson International participated in a panel discussion at the Canadian Global Crops Symposium in Saskatoon this week. Viterra's Kyle Jeworski and Curt Vossen of Richardson International spoke about large scale capital projects in the country and at export

Richardson is spending \$120 million to build an ad-ditional 80,000 tonne conditional 80,000 tonne con-crete grain storage annex at its port terminal facility in North Vancouver. The ex-pansion is slated to be fin-ished in November.

Viterra is investing more than \$100 million to up-grade the Pacific Terminal at the Port of Vancouver, which will more than triple capacity next year.

Both companies are also directing substantial dol-lars for country elevator im-provements and new pro-

cessing facilities.

Jeworski and Vossen say the series of large capital projects illustrate confidence in the future of the grains sector, but there are some longer term concerns. The top issue remains grain transportation and keeping product moving on a consistent basis throughout the entire year. There is agreement that the railways need to have surge capacity, especially during the cold winter months.

"We need to collaborate with the railways so they have the proper crews and power," Jeworski says. "We are reducing our load times (in the country) and unload times at port positions. As we do that, it adds velocity." Vossen says Canada is competing in a big world with many very tough competitors that have geographic and/or climate advantages.

"You need everyone on the same team co-operating and going in the same di-rection. I think that is going

rection. I think that is going to be key to our future success," Vossen says.

The railways have been under fire for their performance since a record crop in 2013, combined with a very cold winter, resulted in mestive orain backloses. in massive grain backlogs

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# Farmland ownership review puzzling

That Agriculture Minister Lyle Stewart and his Sas-katchewan Party government have done an about-face on the question of farmland ownership is likely a good

on the question of the state of the state of the surprise of many, Stewart announced early last week his government's plans to review the Saskatchewan Farm Security Act, beginning with public consultations this cummer. Now, one might assume the act is already strict enough

given that it currently restricts non-Canadians or non-Canadian-owned corporations from possessing more than 10 acres of farmland. However, efforts to circumvent the intent of the act

by those facilitating large-scale investment by pension funds has created an angry buzz on rural Saskatchewan's coffee row.

wan's coffee row.

"Recently, the issue has arisen of whether institutional investors, like pension plans, should be able to purchase farmland in the province, which is not currently allowed under the legislation," Stewart explained to reporters in making the announcement. "There are differing views on this matter, so we want to hear from producers, agricultural stakeholders and interested Saskatchewan residents on what they think."

After consulting this summer, the government intends

to introduce legislation in the fall sitting and plans to see the bill passed in the spring of 2016, Stewart said. However, the timing is rather puzzling in that we are going to the polls in April 2016. Any legislation on the table will die and have to be re-introduced.

Also puzzling is the commitment from Stewart that regulations will be put in place "to prohibit certain organizations, like pension plans and other institutional investors, from purchasing farmland in Saskatchewan."

Exceptions will be made for economic initiatives like oil and gas development. But if this is the plan, why do we really even need public input?

Clearly, one issue is the skyrocketing price of Saskatchewan farmland.

Clearly, one issue is the skyrocketing price of Sas-katchewan farmland.

By coincidence, on the day of Stewart's announce-ment came other news from Farm Credit Candat that land values increased, on average, by 18.7 per cent in 2014. This represented the third straight year Saskatch-ewan land saw a large spike, with average farmland value increasing 28.5 per cent in 2013 and 19.7 per cent in 2012.

By comparison, farmland values nationwide only in-

creased 14.3 per cent in 2014 and 22.1 per cent in 2013.

Moreover, the return of lower prices is causing tighter profit margins—something that's already impacting the

farmland rental market—one can only suspect that sky-

farmland rental market—one can only suspect that sky-rocketing farmland prices will slowdown.

Others see more nefarious politics in the decision.

Progressive Conservative leader Rick Swenson said
the decision was only made after mounting anger in ru-ral Saskatchewan over farmers and ranchers having to
compete with their own Canada Pension Plan funds to buy farmland.



Swenson has vehemently opposed what he calls a loophole in the current act that allowed the Canada Pension Plan Investment Board (CPPIB) to buy Assiniboia Farmland. And the PC leader said CPPIB should be forced to sell the land.
"Not only do I want them out, I want divestiture (of farmland) in a three-year period," he said.
New Democrat agriculture critic Cathy Sproule also asked in the chamber last week why Assiniboia Farmland wasn't the focus of the government action. Sproule noted that the principals in the company included one-time high-ranking Sask Party officials including a former member of Premier Brad Wall's transition team and the former chief of staff of the Sask Party opposition caucus. Again, it's already puzzling.
That said, when the CPPIB bought 115,000 acres in Saskatchewan in late 2013, the acquisition was approved by the Farm Land Security Board and Justice ministry officials. Moreover, government officials also said the large-scale purchases were privately scrutinized and reviewed and no problems were found.
However, no details of this private investigation—including its findings, cost to taxpayers or even who performed it—have been released.

As suggested, there is a lot in this move by Stewart and his government that's downright puzzling.

What are you going to take—the stairs or the elevator? The elevator of course! Especially if you're going up 10 flights and/or you're humping a lump of Samsonite the size of a hay bale. The elevator. So civilized. So necessary. How long do you reckon they've been around?

Would you believe 2,000 years?

At least. We know the Romans used elevators in the

first century BC to move people, livestock, and produce from one level to another.

Well . . . sort of elevators. They weren't very fancy. More

Well ... sort of elevators. They weren't very fancy. More like some planks nailed together and attached to a system of pulleys and ropes operated by slaves. Nothing that Elisha Otis would care to put his name on.

Mr. Otis, of Yonkers, New York, is the engineering genius who came along about 19 centuries later. He was a big fan of the elevator idea but somewhat put off by the tendency of the devices to crash when a cable snapped or a rope broke. If the elevator platform was at any considerable height when this mishap occurred its contents

became violently reacquainted with that more basic engineering principle—gravity. The results were not pretty. What Mr. Otis provided was a safety brake. The Otis Safety Elevator (patented 1861) still went up and down by means of pulleys and cables, but if the cable snapped, a series of ratchet-like teeth automatically deployed from columns supporting the elevator cabin.

These teeth snagged the cabin, preventing it from plumeting down the shaft and crashing into the basement. Instantly, the concert of working in an office, say, 24

Instantly, the concept of working in an office, say, 24 floors above the surface of the earth became achievable. Multi-storey buildings, even skyscrapers, suddenly made good economic sense. Cities acquired a whole new dimension—straight up. The Otis Elevator was to urban centres as fire was to Neanderthals shivering in their caves. The

elevator is a miracle we take for granted. But using one? We don't take that for granted. Riding

But using one? We don't take that for granted. Riding an elevator is a like a religious experience—and not in a good way. The rider surrenders to a machine that is out of his control and moving. The rider can feel the motion but cannot see either destination or point of departure. The rider is trapped and defenceless.

That's if you're the sole occupant. If others board, a ritualized pas de deux ensues. Two riders end up kitty-corner to each other. As more riders enter, everyone shifts to maximize the shrinking space around them. Eye contact and vocalization is discouraged. Looking up at the floor monitor panel is a popular move. Yes . . . there's four lighting up. Oh, and look! Here comes five . . . You can also peer down at your shoes. Everybody improvises their own method of looking as uncomfortable as possible for the duration of the trip. And just in case it's not excruciating enough there's usually a Muzak soundtrack.




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
