# Teagan Littlechief SCMA Female Artist of the Year

Teagan Littlechief of White Bear First Nation is ecstatic about winning her first Female Artist of the Year Award at the Saskatchewan Country Music Awards (SCMA).

Littlchief has won previous awards at the SCMA, including Indigenous Artist of the Year, which she also won this year.

The Beginning
Littlechief grew up listening to her mom sing and was later inspired to take singing lessons.
"My mom sang a lot when I was very little. My music teacher heard me one day singing in the bathroom and she suggested to my mom that I take voice lessons, so from there I went to Shirley Dahlgren in Moosomin. I did voice lessons with her for years and entered a few competitions, and ever since GX94 Star Search in 2002 I have been on my country road." been on my country road.'

#### **Passion for singing**

She says singing is a passion that has helped her overcome challenges.

come challenges.

"It is a passion of mine and it has gotten me out of a lot of hard times. My last release I did as a co-write with Jesse Weiman is called "Need You to Go" and I wrote it based off a relationship that was broken between my son and I. When it came time to choosing, I chose my family and my sobriety over something that I can't control—at least with my family and my music Lean establish what I want. with my family and my music I can establish what I want for myself."

Littlechief is shocked at the number of people who

Littlechief is shocked at the number of people who know her name from singing and performing.

"I just always performed. I really didn't know that my name meant anything. I am still in shock over the weekend so it is very cool to know that Teagan Littlechief means something in Saskatchewan and in the association. I actually went into a store for clothes in Regina last month and the lady asked 'what are you getting clothes for' and I answered saying I had a performance and then she says, 'what is your first name?' and I said Teagan,' and the another lady in the next changing room said 'Teagan,' and the another lady in the next changing room said 'Teagan,' and the another lady in the next changing room said Tea-gan Littlechief?' and continued to talk about my music

and how she loved listening to it. It put me in a position of thinking wow people know me."

"I have been getting songs from Sean Hogan, and other writers, and I co-wrote with a few people, but this year my main focus is either a co-write or a straight write for myself," Littlechief said.

#### Goals as a singer

Littlechief says she plans to continue to perform and accomplish many goals as a singer.
"Just to perform, meet new people, take in as much knowledge as I can from the industry for the path that I

have chosen and be able to bring it back to communities that are unaware or don't understand the industry or are too afraid to step foot into it. That is the one thing that has held me back, is my fear of the unknown.

"I just got signed with Black Mountain Music and Me-

dia Management and my manager Pinky Celena Simms is the one who basically holds my hand when I venture into the world of music and it opens my eyes. When I come back home I get kids who ask, 'how do you do it? or where do you go?" and so I offer them to come on the road with me once and check it out."

A feeling unlike any other
Littlechief says there is no feeling like winning the SCMA awards and being recognized in the province for

ner singing.
"This year, last year, and the year before I have won SCMA awards. The first year ever winning was when Covid hit and everything was still transitioning from online to the world. It was three years ago, we had that big snow fall here where you couldn't even get out of the house, I was watching on my iPad and when they announced the

winner I yelled 'Oh my God!' my son and his friend came upstairs and were concerned, but then I told them I had won the Indigenous Artist of the Year!
"This year for the Indigenous Artist of the Year, I was up against strong performers who have a bigger following and are signed with labels. I was very shocked and surprised when they called my name. Like it's me who is from the rez—that is what I call it, that is my home at the total call it is the strength of the strength o White Bear First Nations. You got me tucked away in the Moose Mountain area and I don't really see a lot of anywhose Mountain area and 1 don't rearly see a lot of anything unless I am on the road doing music. My following is not as big as everyone else's so when they called my name it was definitely a huge moment of 'Oh my God, and thank you God, thank you Jesus, and like oh Jesus take the wheel!' I literally went up there with no speech prepared for either awards.

"I was scrolling on Facebook and I came across a comment and it said, Teagan Littlechief is the first Indigenous to win Female Artist of the Year,' and I thought 'Wow that is cool!' I like that because now I hope that these little girls or little boys that love music see that it is possible. I think this is my second nomination in the Female Artist of the Year. I was up against Shantaia, Jordyn Pollard, Amy Nelson, and Katelyn Lennar, and I was just sitting there and my son asked if I wanted to move and I said, 'no no that is okay, I kind of have a feeling of who might win' and then when they announced me I sat there for four seconds in shock until my son finally said, 'Go!' I got up there and I was so emotional. I had always had a speech prepared for Female Artist of the Year somewhere in the back of my head and then when I got up there I just got so emotional."

#### Career Highlights

Littlechief says she has had many special moments throughout her singing career.

"I have signed with Black Mountain Music, Media, and Management, I have performed at TeleMiracle, I won the Queen's Jubilee Medal last year, and I always love performing. My days have picked up and last week I got the notification that I will be performing at the OSAC (Organization of Saskatchewan Arts Councils) Showcase in October in Saskatoon. (Local arts councils attend the

showcase to choose the acts they will host in communities

Writing Music
Littlechief is working on new songs right now.
"I am working on a project with Aaron Goodwin and I

am working on a Project with Aaron Goodwin and I am working on a Christmas album, but we don't know if it is going to come out in 2024 or if it is going to be completed for 2025.

"Life experience influences me to write, and a lot of people are going through the same thing. I love how Jelly Roll does his thing—he has been an inspiration in the song-writing aspect in the sense of being able to talk about sobriety, talk about struggles, and that pain and make it so it is a powerful meaningful song."

Realizing dreams
Littlechief says winning Female Artist of the Year is one of her biggest achievements and most memorable moments. "It ranks at the top. It was one of my dream for the state of the same of the s a long time ever since joining SCMA, and I even started picking out a shelf. I like to put things out into the universe and pray about things. So I thought, I am going to be prepared for one day that I do win Female Artist of the Year. I want to have somewhere special to put my awards and my accomplishments. Female Artist of the Year has got to be in the top five for sure," Littlechief said.

Next Steps
Littlechief says she hopes to perform for International crowds. "I just hope my career takes me on the road. I want to go to Italy," she said. "I want to go where my mu-

want to go to Italy," she said. "I want to go where my music is played the most and go check it out. Mexico and Italy were in my top streams. I have had more plays on Spotify in Mexico, Italy, and Australia.

"I have always said I would love to perform outside of Canada and my dream place would be Italy. Then, I had an interview with a gentleman in the radio station in Italy a few months back and he said, 'your music is played so much here,' it is very cool and my dream would be to play there somedav." there someday.



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### **South East Cornerstone School Division**

# School bus driver retention remains a sticking point at SECPSD

The bi-annual transportation report for the South East Cornerstone Public School Division was in the hands of Transporta-tion and Facilities Manager Andy Dobson on Wednesday afternoon, June 19. Dobson spoke to the board members

during their regular business session in the division's head office in Weyburn.

the division's nead office in Weypurn.
The ongoing problem of retaining bus drivers was part of the presentation, with Dobson noting that one Wawota route had been eliminated due to lack of driver(s) and then later reinstated while another route in the Lampman area was merged with another, again due to the lack of a driver in the previous school year. Current unfilled routes are in the Weldon (Bienfait) and Estevan Comprehensive School routes as well as two in the Carlyle region.

A total of 1,213 routes were cancelled in

the last half of this academic year, with 42 half-days lost due to mechanical needs and 249 full days due to weather along with 172 half-day route losses due to weather.

172 half-day route losses due to weather. The lack of a substitute driver accounted for 173 half days and 577 full days.

There are currently 155 transportation routes covered by the division's buses, carrying 4,593 students, well over 50 per cent of the total student population with a 25,000 km total coverage on a daily basis.

The average rural one-way ride time remains at approximately 48 minutes with the longest ride time being the Estevan/ Torquay and Weyburn/Oungre routes at around 90 minutes

Dobson noted that in the past school year the division acknowledged five driver resignations, two more drivers had passed away while 15 drivers came on board as newly hired. He added however that while recruitment was often fairly successful, drivers often switched roles to take up other positions, some in the school division as education assistants or caretakers for example. # **Westman RCMP Report**

**83 calls for service**During the week of June 16 to June 22, Westman RCMP received a total of 83 calls for service. Of the 83 calls, 21 were traffic related, including 10 moving traffic/speeding violations, six mischief files, and six requests for wellbeing checks.

## Four traffic stops in Virden **for drivers using cell phones**On June 16, during a routine traffic patrol in the town of

Virden, RCMP observed a female driving while holding a cell phone up to her ear. A traffic stop was conducted and this driver was issued a traffic offene notice for using a cellular phone or other hand-operated electronic device

while driving a vehicle which carries three-day licence suspension penalty, as well as a \$672 fine.

Both suspects were arrested and a 25-year-old female was charged with breaking, entering and committing mis-chief. She will appear in court in August.

Impaired driver goes off road into body of water On June 19, RCMP received a report of a pickup truck driving off the road and into a body of water on Road 254 in the RM of Sifton. Police attended and witnessed signs of impairment in the driver. A 63-year-old male was arrested and charged with operation while impaired (alcohol) of motor vehicle, and operation while over 80 mg/s (alcohol) of motor vehicle. A breath test was conducted with results of 150 mg/s and 130 mg/s. The male was later released on an appearance notice and will appear in court in August.

#### 40 km/hr over the speed limit

On June 20, during a routine traffic patrol on Highway in the RM of Sifton, RCMP observed a vehicle travel-In the RMI of SHORI, K.MI observed a Venicle traveling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 150 km/hr in a 110 km/hr zone. RCMP conducted a traffic stop with the vehicle where it was discovered that the driver had expired licence plates on the vehicle. Upon further investigation it was determined that the vehicle was appropriately registered, but the new, valid licence plate had not yet been affixed to the vehicle. The driver was issued traffic offence notices for speeding which carries a fine of \$573, and displaying a number plate that does not match the registration card which carries as fine of \$133.







# SaskPower eyes south for nuclear plant locations

A series of community meetings were held last week in Oxbow, Estevan, Torquay, Macoun, Midale, and Weyburn to talk about bringing nuclear power to Saskatchewan. Currently, SaskPower has its eyes on two candidate sites around Estevan—the Boundary Site just south of that city, and the Rafferty Site a little further west. The ultimate plan is for SaskPower to secure a pair of sites—each secure a pair of sites—each being a quarter-section in size—that could host two small modular reac-tors capable of producing 630 MW of power. A final investment decision to go ahead with the initial SMR will be made in five years' will be made in five years

time.
"These are two viable sites, there's more research to be done," said Wes Cates, Stakeholder Rela-tions Consultant with tions Consultant with SaskPower during an in-formation session in Tortormation session in Torquay. The purpose of the public meetings was to give people a chance to ask questions face-to-face, gaining accurate information from the source. "That's what we're trying to do, and just be transparent and share the information," Cates said. "There's still decisions to

"There's still decisions to be made, so sometimes we might not have the answer that you're looking for, but we'll give you as much in-formation as we can to give you a better understanding of the processes."

The Elbow area was

also a potential site, but it seems as though Sask-Power is focussing around the Rafferty Reservoir (RM of Cambria) and Boundary Dam (RM of Estevan) as fa-

Dain (RM) of Estevan) as ra-voured locations. Before deciding on the official site of Saskatch-ewan's first SMR, more studies and research need to be completed—espe-cially around themes of community impact, safety concerns, ecological, and

environmental.

explained. Stakeholder and public engagement is expected to be ongoing throughout the entire process, with the entire process, with site selection and project

site selection and project pre-planning predicted to wrap up mid-2025.

Coal has been a hot commodity in southern Saskatchewan since John Palliser first picked up a chunk of it in 1857, so questions on how that industry will be affected—especially in terms of employment in terms of employment—were top of mind.

"That's one of SaskPow-r's main focuses as well, doing what we can to make transition as smooth and seamless as possible," Cates said during a conversation about a future shift of employment from coal to a nuclear facility. From current numbers, conventional coal makes up the second largest power source in the province (24 per cent), approximately 1,281 MW. Natural gas is top (39 per cent), produc-ing 2,065 MW, with hydro and hydro imports plac-ing third (21 per cent) with 1.155 MW. Wind and solar

#### **Decision to** build still five years away

It's been two years since SaskPower selected exactly what kind of reactor would best suit provincial power needs. In June, 2022, Sask-Power confirmed that the GE Hitachi BWRX-300 is the technology they're go-ing with in SMR developing with in SMR develop-ment. This particular reac-tor is the tenth generation of GE Hitachi's Boiling Water Reactors, with sev-eral SMRs now being used for research purposes. Cur-rently, SMRs are not being used on commercial power grids, but development is happening in the U.S., Poland, Argentina, China, Russia, and South Korea.

1,155 MW. Wind and solar follow (11 per cent with 617 MW and two per cent with 95 MW respectively), with the remaining 142 MW (three per cent) generated through other means. Combined, the provincial power mix generates a capacity of 5,355 MW (as of March 31).

One concern is that of water used in an SMR becoming contaminated and what happens after its use. Information from Sask-Power notes nuclear pow-er in general uses thermal generation, with slightly warmer water being re-turned to the source. Potential impacts of cycling warm water back into a

waterbody are being stud-

Billed as one of the safest energy generation options around, nuclear power is a tightly-regulated industry in Canada with no accidents being reported over the past five decades. The BWRX-300 itself is lauded as a safe technology, with proponents of nuclear energy claiming a chest x-ray would expose you to more radiation than living within a few kilometres of a nuclear power plant in Canada for 100 years.

Drawing from the his-tory and construction of other nuclear power facili-ties around the world will also yield important infor-mation in how the local project continues.

So definitely, in taking that information and tak-ing the lessons learned, best management practices and applying that to this facility so that we can have one of the safest and most efficient state-of-the-art facilities to bring to Saskatch-ewan," Cates replied when asked if previous builds would be helpful in this

new path.

Between September 2022
and May of this year, Sask-Power noted more than 7,700 interactions in just over 150 in-person and on-line meetings. From those conversations, they found 65 per cent of people were in support of nuclear pow-er in Saskatchewan. There's still a long road

ahead with a final invest-ment decision whether or not to proceed with building an SMR slated for 2029. If that happens, a license to construct would be obtained in the following year and a license to op-erate needed in 2033 before commercial operation could begin 10 years from

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

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
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
