Weedmark wins Sask Party nomination in Moosomin-**Montmartre**

Kevin Weedmark defeats two other candidates in race for nomination

Kevin Weedmark has been nominated by the Saskatchewan Party to represent the party in the Moosomin-Montmartre riding.

The nomination meeting was held in Grenfell on Tuesday, September 10.

After Moosomin MLA Steven Bonk announced he is

not running again in the upcoming provincial election, as he will run as the federal Conservative candidate in the Souris-Moose Mountain riding, a Saskatchewan Party nomination race was held in the Moosomin-Montmartre riding with three candidates vying for the support of Saskatchewan Party members across the constitutions. constituency.

Hundreds of people from every corner of the sprawling riding filled the Grenfell community Hall for the nomination Tuesday.

Weedmark will represent the Saskatchewan Party in Moosomin-Montmartre in the upcoming provincial election.

In his acceptance speech, Weedmark said he was thankful for everyone who came out to vote on Tues-

thankful for everyone who came out to vote on Tuesday.

"I would like to say thank you very much to the other candidates, who both ran very good campaigns, and thank you to every one of you who came out to support democracy tonight," he said.

"Thank you to those who came from here in Grenfell and all the way from Indian Head, from Vibank, from Pocannial from Locannia from a great her idine.

Rocanville, from Moosomin, from across the riding.

"I talked to some people who were on their way from Francis along Highway 33 at the farthest point southwest of the constituency. "It's great to see so many people come out and it's

great to see so many new memberships across the constituency through this process."

"In the newspaper we often do interviews with folks who have gone through difficult times—who have lost their house in a fire or have a medical need and the community has rallied around them," Weedmark told the crowd.

"The one thing those folks always say is that through the tragedy they have found out how many friends they have.
"I'm very fortunate that nothing like

that has ever happened to me, I've nev-er experienced a tragedy like that, but er experienced a tragedy like that, but through this nomination process I had so many people come up and offer their sup-port, give me their help and offer to do anything to help, now I know how those folks feel.

"Through this process I am very touched because I never knew how many friends that I have. Thank to you all of you for the support. And I've met so many new friends across the constituency.

"Now the work begins of preparing for the next election. The election call is comthe flext election. The election can is conting in just a few days and I need all of you behind me, we're going to have to stand together as the Saskatchewan Party. We're going to have to work together to make the Moosomin-Montmartre constituency the best that it can be. Thank you folks very, very much."

Current Moosomin MLA Steven Bonk was there to congratulate Weedmark, as were neighboring MLAs Daryl Harrison of the Cannington constituency and Warren Kaeding of Melville-Saltcoats. Kaeding was also guest speaker for the nomi-

nation meeting.
Bonk, first elected in 2016 and re-elected in 2020, will continue as MLA until the provincial election is called. The provincial election is scheduled for October 28.

Bonk announced in July that he will not run again as MLA, and in August he won the race for the Conservative nomination in Souris-Moose Mountain. He will represent the Conservative Party when the federal election is called.

With Weedmark's nomination, the Sas-katchewan Party was the first to nominate a full slate of candidates

The NDP, which finished second in the Moosomin constituency in the last election, has nominated Chris Ball of Indian Head as their candidate in Moosomin-Montmartre, and the Green Party has nominated Rémi Rheault of Langenburg. night Tuesday as hundreds of people cast ballots for the three candidates for the Saskatchewan Party nomination.

The story came about when a local veteran told his story to the World-Spectator, and led to an investigation by the Military Ombudsman. In his report recommending the federal government com-pensate soldiers who had been subject to experiments, he referenced Kinna's article.
Publisher Kevin Weedmark said he is happy to turn

over the role of editor to Kinna.

"Kara has been integral to the operation of this business for the last 22 years," he said.
"She has excelled in every role she has taken on with the business, and I have no doubt she will do an amazing job as editor. With the new roles I'm taking on, Kara is taking on responsibility for the editorial side of the business.

Moosomin housing incentive set to reach its goal

The phone in Casey McCormac's office might need to be replaced soon due to wear and tear. Moosomin's Economic Development Officer has been fielding an onslaught of calls after word of the town's residential housing incentive made national—and even international—

"For the first week, for sure, the phone was ringing off "For the first week, for sure, the phone was ringing off the hook. I've never answered so many phone calls! A lot of people just call me and ask if it's real," she told those gathered at Tuesday's Chamber of Commerce meeting. 'But I have had a lot of genuine interest. I actually had a family out here yesterday, they drove all the way from Calgary because they want to move here; they were looking at empty lots. They talked about how they don't want to raise their kids in Calgary because of the crime rate, and they thought Moseomir was amazing. So they drove and they thought Moosomin was amazing. So they drove out here. I have another guy coming up from Calgary next week, so you can definitely see the interest we've

had."

At the centre of the plan is \$30,000 or any new housing unit, with an extra \$8,000 per additional door for multi-unit housing. The incentive came on the heels of a \$992,000 grant from the federal Housing Accelerator Fund with Moosomin being one of only three Saskatchewan centres to gain dollars under the grant, along with the Town of Outlook and City of Humboldt.

"If you op back to several years are when the Economic

"If you go back to several years ago when the Economic Development Board was formed and the three funding partners got together and we started talking about things, we talked about how to grow our community, whether it was adding businesses or adding services—all the things that was thought we provisional for Measuring "said". that we thought we envisioned for Moosomin," said Councillor Murray Gray during the Chamber presenta-tion. "We worked on that, and we got some wins, and we've added some businesses, and we had some really good irons in the fire, but all of a sudden, housing started to creep up that list of things that we need because we added so many other things in our community, but we never added any doors.

Any building permit submitted to the Town after Aug. 21, 2023 qualifies to be part of the program, which has an end date of either March 31, 2027, or earlier if the goal of 43 units has been met. So far, around 72 per cent of that target number has been realized with 31 building permits currently submitted. There are 30 empty lots currently available to fill in Moosomin, and the prospect of reaching

the project's goal and beyond is nearing reality.

"We're hoping to fill in the town, and at some point in

time when all the lots in town are filled up, we're going to have to expand our borders," Gray said. "One of the things that I've learned in economic development and the time that we spent on it, when you talk to businesses about coming and setting up in your community, they all want to know what your population is, and I think we have a bigger number than the census, and we have a bigger number just because of our 'get' er done' attitude."

According to the latest census numbers, there are 2,774

people that call Moosomin home with items like the housg incentive poising the town for further growth. Outgoing Moosomin-Montmarte MLA Steven Bonk

was in attendance during last week's Chamber meeting, and congratulated the town on their unique housing

"As far as I know, no one else is doing this, so my hat's off to you because this is out of the box thinking, and particularly with the CBA—even that's out of the box thinking for Saskatchewan," he said. "So whatever you're do-

ing here in Moosomin, it's working—congratulations!"
Other areas across the province have taken notice of Moosomin's success, asking for guidance on how they can generate the same excited curiosity for their areas.
"I've had calls from four or five municipalities asking questions about this, because they want to replicate it themselves," McCormac said.

Illimately the secret ingradient to the success of the log-

themselves," McCormac said.

Ultimately, the secret ingredient to the success of the local housing accelerator comes down to an area Moosomin has always excelled in—working together.

"The key to a lot of the things that we work on is the collaboration aspect of what we do because we get a lot of people in the room working toward the same common goal with lots of different ideas," Gray said. "That's where this idea came from, and to be honest with you, in the beginning, it was a little bit of a hard sell even to myself because it just seems too easy, but at the end of the day, simple is easier to market and the story caught on across the country because of that."

China strikes back at Canadian canola farmers after EV tariffs

Ottawa's push to protect the battery and EV sectors left Western Canadian canola farmers vulnerable to retaliation by China

The response to Canada's decision to impose tariffs on Chinese electric vehicles (EVs) last week was predictable. Ottawa knew that retaliation would follow, and China quickly responded by launching an anti-dump-

would follow, and China quickly responded by faunching an anti-dump-ing investigation into Canadian canola exports.

While there is no evidence of actual dumping, the facts are largely ir-relevant. China is likely to move forward with sanctions, regardless of the explanations provided by the Canola Council or Canadian diplomats.

As in 2019, when Canada faced a similar impasse, we could again see

borders close to Canadian agricultural exports.

In March 2019, after the arrest of Meng Wanzhou in the Huawei incident, China abruptly halted Canadian canola shipments, citing pest contamination as the official reason.

The Canadian canola industry suffered losses estimated between \$1.54 billion and \$2.35 billion in sales, with price declines persisting until August 2020 due to the suspended export licenses. Pork exports were also affected, but canola has always been a primary target for China in these diplomatic standoffs.

Canola holds a special place in Canada's agricultural identity, and targeting it first is a calculated move by China. The crop was developed in Canada, and its very name—derived from "Canada" and "ola" (referring to oil low in acid)—underscores its deep national significance. As the world's largest exporter of canola, Canada plays a pivotal role in both global food markets and biofuel production.

Conversely, China is the largest oilseed importer, with half of Canada's canola exports destined for its market. By hitting canola, China sends a clear message: it can disrupt a critical Canadian sector anytime political

Farmers in Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba—where most of Canada's 43,000 canola producers are located—are already feeling the impact. Yesterday, canola prices dropped nearly five percent, and further declines could mirror the prolonged downturn of 2019. The symbolism of canola

makes it a prime target.

Whenever Canada moves against China's interests, Canadian agricultural commodities such as canola are the first to be leveraged.

Western Canadian farmers now face significant uncertainty, largely due to Ottawa's aggressive push to bolster the battery and EV sectors.

The federal government has committed nearly \$50 billion toward build-

ing battery factories, a bold gamble that led to the tariffs on Chinese EVs. The official rationale, it seems, is to protect domestic manufacturers from an influx of cheaper green vehicles from China, even if that means limiting affordable options for Canadian consumers and straining relations with

This approach prioritizes the development of Canadian-made EVs over the potential benefits of allowing lower-cost imports to help reduce carbon emissions

This industrial strategy follows a familiar pattern: when a government decides that a product must be produced domestically, at all costs, it often results in less competition, higher prices, and questionable product qual-

The dairy industry offers a prime example. Ottawa has funnelled billions into the sector, supported by highly restrictive trade barriers. While this policy has propped up dairy farmers, it has done so at the expense of other agricultural sectors—wheat, canola, beef, and pork—all of which


could arguably benefit from the same level of government support.

In the end, the federal government will likely compensate canola farmers for their losses, as it has done before.

Farmers are resilient, but Canada's diplomatic standing, particularly with China, continues to erode.

For those old enough to remember, Pierre Trudeau once idealized China, yet today, his son Justin faces a more hostile Beijing. History, it seems, has a twisted sense of irony.

Nomination race was an inspiring experience

For over 20 years, I have covered municipal, provincial, and federal elections in the region.

provincial, and rederal elections in the region. Kevin has interviewed Pierre Poillievre here in the World-Spectator office. He has interviewed Premier Scott Moe and many cabinet ministers here in the World-Spectator office. He has interviewed the leader of the Green Party, who made the World-Spectator office her first

who made the world-spectator office her first stop after being elected party leader. Like Kevin, I have interviewed premiers, ministers, and many, many politicians over the years about more issues than I could ever recount. It's always fascinating to talk to politicians and watch the political process in action, but last Tuesday was an eye-opener for us as this time one of us was a candidate instead of a journalist.

When Kevin decided to put his name forward to run as a Sask Party candidate for the Moo-somin-Montmartre riding after MLA Steven Bonk decided he would not run again in order to become a federal Conservative candidate in the Souris-Moose Mountain Riding, I knew it would be a lot of work, but if anyone could do it, Kevin could. In the summer Kevin is often up at 4 am taking sunrise photos and drone photos, and has his first meeting of the day at 6:30 or 7:30. He's not afraid of hard work.

But watching Kevin run a nomination cam-paign and then watching as the voting actu-ally happened the night of the election is unlike anything I've ever experienced before. It was an exhausting, wonderful, nerve-wracking, exhilarating experience.

I have a new level of respect now for anyone

who puts their name forward to run for provincial or federal politics.

For one, the campaign process is work—lots of work. What it truly means is you roll up your sleeves and you ditch a great deal of your personal (and in Kevin's case business) commitments, and you spend days, weekends, and evenings calling people, selling memberships and compaigning.

and campaigning.

There is only a limited time to get that done, and so normal life as you know it is tossed entirely out the window. It's suspended, and all energy goes into the campaign.

If you really want to get your message out, you work until you are ready to drop most days, and get at it again the next day.

Once you feel confident that you have done all you can to gain support and get the message out about who you are, part two starts—getting the people who support you out to the polls. You must then talk to all those people that you talked to before and tell them that if they truly want to support you and see you win, then they must come out to vote.

In this case, that meant asking people to literally ditch their combines at the busiest time of year, go to the Grenfell Community Hall, take

time to vote, and, if they lived some distance from Grenfell, then spend time driving back.

This is a pretty major ask for people at harvest.

I knew Kevin was asking for a lot, and if people made the effort to vote when it meant possibly risking some of their livelihood (there was rain in the forecast for the following day which made it even worse), then he had a lot to be thankful for. At the nomination meeting, running on little food and even less sleep, a sense of calm finally set in with Kevin and his team. I heard many people tell Kevin that they hadn't slept for a couple of nights, they were so anxious about the results.

Finally, it was here. Finally they would find out if their hard work, and all the hard work of all the volunteers who pitched in to help, would pay off. And finally, the campaigning had come to an end. There was nothing left to do but visit with the voters as they came into the hall, and say thank you for coming out to vote.

And that was the most inspiring part of the entire process—watching the people come to tool. It was truly wonderful watching the Grenfell Community Hall fill with people passionate

tell Community Hall fill with people passionate to support their candidate. Regardless of who they were supporting, the democratic process in action is a fantastic thing to behold.

I knew some of the people and what it took for them to be there. The couple with children who found a babysitter so they could both drive an hour from the largest town in the riding to wate. The man who runs one of the largest by since the property beginning the support of the largest by since the support of the support vote. The man who runs one of the largest businesses in the region who just had knee surgery nesses in the region who just had knee surgery but came out because Kevin needed his support. Some who shut their combines down early that night, making a financial sacrifice, to come and vote. I can't explain the feeling I had every time one I saw one of Kevin's supporters come through the door. Face after friendly face filed in to vote and shook Kevin's hand. It was investible and with expression of these Let blice. in to vote and shook Kevin's hand. It was in-credible, and with every one of them I felt like my heart would burst. Seeing people brought together in that way was a high point of the night—knowing that people weren't just say-ing they supported their candidate, but seeing them actually do it at the busiest time of year.

for many young people, permanent residents and new citizens it was their first time voting. I found the whole experience inspiring, and I don't think I'll ever look at elections, or those brave enough to let their names stand in them, the same way again.

PlayFair Daycare now in fundraising mode for second building

LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER PlayFair Daycare in Moosomin has en

tered full fundraising mode for its second building. Sponsorship packages are being sent out to local businesses with different tiers to help the daycare reach their ambi-

tious goal.
"Our budget is estimated right now at \$4.4 million and the level of sponsorships are Dream Builder for \$400,000; Bright Futures for \$100,000; Vision Maker for \$25,000; Paving the Way for \$5,000; and Helping Hand for \$1,000," explained Moosomin's Economic Development Officer Cases McCorrae, capacities any help-life ficer Casey McCormac, speaking on behalf of the daycare at the Moosomi Chamber of of the daycare at the Moosomi Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday. "Each level will receive some sort of naming rights and recognition, which is depending on what level you pick."

The top three sponsorship levels are exclusive with a limited number of spaces—two for December 1911 for the form of the specific forms.

tusive with a minted inhiber of spaces— two for Dream Builder, five for Bright Fu-tures, and 10 for Vision Maker. Of the total project budget, \$1.5 million will be government funded while another \$1.5 million is self-funded. The remaining \$1.4 million will be sought from the community, hence the need for a large-scale

"We truly appreciate all the groups that have come to help us already with fundraising events or ideas," McCormac told those gathered at last week's Chamber of Commerce meeting. "This is going to be a huge project that we need Moosomin and

surrounding communities to get behind."
PlayFair Daycare will also be releasing a video campaign on Facebook very soon and has gone live with their playfairday care.com website. An option to donate on-line is also available through the site.

ine is also available through the site.

"Our goal is to start construction in spring of 2025 and we're still hoping for opening by the end of 2026," explained McCormac, who also brought a copy of the daycare's floor plan for Chamber members. "We are nearing the final floor plan. We're ensuring proper space requirements and working with the daycare con-

sultant to review."

Plans for a second daycare building began last fall when the provincial gov-ernment granted PlayFair Daycare 90 additional spaces to be used in a second location. The announcement was exciting. but the group had no illusions that such an endeavour would be easy—hence the call to the local business community for help.
"Any businesses interested will be able

"Any businesses interested will be able to see the different levels of sponsorship and what they will get in the new building for that sponsorship," McCormac said. "The sponsorship package includes information about why we need the daycare, the impact of daycares, information on the committee, and overview of the project, the funding details, and the sponsorship options and levels."

There's been a fantastic start already to

There's been a fantastic start already to raising money for the new building, the most recent being the Beer Mile fundraiser that brought in an estimated \$3,000 on Sept. 7. Another big donation came from the Moosomin Rodeo Committee, who handed over a cheque worth \$12,500— thanks in large part to Calcutta winners P&H in Moosomin donating back their winnings. And who could forget the wild-ly successful Smile Cookie fundraiser that is successful smile Cookie fundraiser that saw the Moosomin Tim Horton's raise the highest Smile Cookie sales in Saskatchewan for a staggering third year in a row, gifting \$45,000 of those cookie proceeds to PlayFair Daycare.

There's still a long way to go in fund-raising for the 11,600 sq ft building, and the daycare is currently planning a trip of the month lottery as a major fundraiser on the path to reaching their goal.

On Wednesday, September 11, Anytime Fitness challenged people to climb 110 flights of stairs in 30 minutes to raise money for the Moosomin and Wapella Fire Departments and in honor of the memory of those who lost their lives on 9/11.

Jim McGinty, who works with Hutch Ambulance and serves on the Wapella Fire Department, was one of the people who took that challenge, took that challenge with

people who took that challenge, took that challenge when the extra weight of a firefighters oxygen tank on his back. "It's a good way to honour the emergency services personnel that died on September 11," he says. "There were 343 New York City Fire Department (FDNY) firefighters that made the ultimate sacrifice that day trying to help their fallow men. So it's just a way to remember those

343 New York City Fire Department (FDNY) firefighters that made the ultimate sacrifice that day trying to help their fellow men. So it's just a way to remember those guys as well as everyone who died that day.

"It's also a really good fundraiser for the Wapella and Moosomin Fire Departments. Thanks to Anytime Fitness Moosomin for putting it on. It's for a really good cause because the proceeds go to both departments and they're volunteer departments so we always need to be fundraising because equipment is expensive. You're looking at about \$15,000 per firefighter for all of their gear including boots, pants, jacket, gloves, helmet, SCBA. So it's just a great way to raise funds and raise community awareness of what volunteer fire departments do in the province.

"There are lots of departments like Wapella. Moosomin is a bigger department, but there are lots of smaller departments that struggle for funding and struggle at fundraising, so anything that our communities can do to support us is always greatly appreciated."

McCinty says it's important to keep the memory of the 9/11 firefighters alive, as it was an unprecedented moment in firefighting history.

"It's the biggest loss of firefighters in one single emergency that the world has ever seen," he says. "Those guys went into those towers knowing that there was a good chance they were going to lose their lives. The EDNY lost

went into those towers knowing that there was a good chance they were going to lose their lives. The FDNY lost a huge amount of experience, knowledge and members in the space of an hour.

"It's not often that volunteer fire departments here in

Saskatchewan have to deal with situations like that but when you get the call and it comes in, there's always that chance that you're not going to come home.
"So it's just kind of like a tribute to them and to stand

on the stand of like a tribute to them and to stand in solidarity with those guys that made the ultimate sacrifice on that day. They were climbing those floors—climbing towards something—and they had no idea what they were going to encounter and despite the horror that they encountered that morning, they still went in, they still went up the stairs and still tried to do what they could to save as many people as they could.

"It's just to remember those guys, the paramedics, the EMTs, the police officers and all of the civilians that died on that awful day."

Esterhazy Town Council

Council updated on smart meter progress

LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER Esterhazy residents have been receiving letters in the mail about the new digital water meters, and Waterworks Con-sultant Andrew Hickey updated council about the coming change to the Metercorp smart meters.

smart meters.

"One change in particular, they had planned on using the flour mill as a secondary point for the radio receiving station but it cannot be used, as it is a historical site," he said during Esterhazy Town Council's regular meeting on Sept. 11.
"What we're going to do instead is, by the end of the month we're coing to have two end of the month, we're going to have two antenna attached to the top of the water tower here, one for everyday use and then a backup.'

There are currently 400 meters at Me-

There are currently 400 meters at Metercorp's Calgary warehouse, destined for Esterhazy with the rest coming soon.

"When we signed the contract with them, they immediately put a request in for a sufficient amount of meters to cover our needs," explained Mayor Grant Forster. "It's a logistical thing; they don't have caped to the 1200 meters they can." have space to store 1,200 meters, they can handle 400 so they'll ship those 400 out."

The projected completion date for the water meter changeover is Dec. 20, and Metercorp will be holding a public information meeting soon to answer questions

from the public.

"We're going to have them come out and talk about the process of what's required for people to get their meter changed," Forster said. "And stress the fact that this is not optional, this is a re-

Returning officers will be paid hourly

A question many municipalities are likely revisiting in the months leading up to the November election is what returning officers ought to receive as monetary compensation for their services.

ompensation for their services.

"The last time that we changed the rates was in 2012, so we needed to update the wages for those positions for the election," Forster explained.

Under the new rates, the Returning Of-

Under the new rates, the Returning Orficer will be paid \$30 per hour, Deputy Returning Officer receives \$25 per hour, and the Poll Clerk will earn \$20 per hour. "If you get somebody that's giving up their day, you want to make sure that it's worth their while," Forster said.

Third reading on Atwater fire bylaw

The Town has been updating their fire agreements for the past few months, and officially gave third reading to Bylaw 787-24, which is the fire protection agreement with the Village of Atwater. Services pro-

vided will not change, but an annual flat rate will be applied.

"Because they are such a small com-munity now, we basically went with a flat

rate of \$500 and we'll provide them with fire services for the year," Forster said. The idea to update fire agreements came out of a regional fire board meeting in the spring.

"We've been doing that with the two big RMs and all the communities around," Forster said. "We've been upgrading our bylaws and our agreements, so it's just part of the whole process.'

Temporary reps for Langenburg board

For the next couple of months, representation from Esterhazy at the Langenburg and District Activity Centre Board will rotate between council members. The board had requested an official representative be named from council, but that de

cision will happen after the election.
"Councillor [Earl] Nickell was our board member, and they have in their bylaws that you're only allowed to serve a finite amount of time," Forster explained. "It didn't coincide with the election, so he had to drop off the board. So that was leaving us with a with a vacancy for the Town of Esterhazy on the board."

Councillor Maggie Rowland will attend the Board's next meeting, and a future councillor will be officially appointed af-ter the Neurophys ter the November election

Traffic and speed concern

Residents have been voicing their con-cern over the amount and speed of traf-fic at the intersection of James Street and Highway 22, and the issue made it's way onto last week's council agenda.

onto last week's council agenda.
"It's a busy corner for kids and everything else," Forster agreed. "We have vehicles coming in that honestly don't slow down until they're well into town and we've got young kids trying to cross there to go to school. It's a concern."

For now, Public Works is going to as-

sess the area to find out exactly what sort

sess the area to find out exactly what sort of mitigation effort ought to be in place. "We are going to put up a pedestrian corridor there," confirmed Forster. "How we manage to make it happen is for Public

Works to figure out because it is quite a

The general plan is to establish a signed corridor with lighting to indicate the crosswalk.
