## Local doc named Family Physician of the Year

Dr. Schalk Van der Merwe has been awarded Family Physician of the Year for Saskatchewan.

Van der Merwe is from South Africa nd has lived and served southeast Saskatchewan as a family doctor for the past 25 years. Van der Merwe came to Canada in 1998 and is one of 14 physicians in Moosomin, who also serve smaller communities through local clinics.

"We came to Canada in September of 1998, to Redvers with a four-month plan. We were away for the weekend when Henriette, my wife, saw an ad in the paper that said they were looking for a locum in Redvers for four months and we thought let's go on an adventure.
"We came for four months because I was

in a specialty position and then, I was going to go back to South Africa and specialize. I really wanted to do heart transplant surgeries. The first heart transplant surgery ever done was in South Africa in 1969. It

"We had always decided that if we had kids that I wouldn't do that job because that's a 20 hour a day job, but we'd come for four months, and two weeks before we flew to Canada, Henriette found out that she was pregnant with Heinrich, with our son, but we decided to go anyway. "I remember we came in August, and all

we knew about Canada is that it was cold,

so we came in August and it was hot—we had no shorts and no short sleeve shirts.
"We worked in Redvers from August to

December of 1998 and then I met Dr. Crouse at a convention in December and he asked what my plan was after my locum, and I told him that we weren't entirely sure and he said, 'Do you want to come work in Moosomin for a few months?' Then, I talked to Henriette and she said we could extend it for a few months, and 25 years later we're still here."

## Stresses of travelling to a new country Van der Merwe says there were many

little stresses when coming to Canada from South Africa. "I remember flying into Regina when there was one luggage carousel. That's all there was.

carousel. That's all there was.

"I remember landing in Montreal and that was a funny story. I said to the lady who booked our trip, 'We've never been out of the country so please make sure that our hotel is right at the airport,' and she said, 'Yup, no problem!' So we get to Montreal, we get off, everybody is speaking French and we didn't know that was a thing in Canada. We found an agent and I asked where the hotel was and she replied saying it wasn't at this airport. replied saying it wasn't at this airport. So, my wife who's four weeks pregnant and nauseous, she said, 'I'm going to sit here with all of our suitcases while you go

sort this out.' I had the telephone number for the hotel, but as soon as I pick up the pay phone, it's all in French. I can't speak French and I'm thinking this is not good. I put the phone back and I walked around, then I would come back and pick up the pay phone again because I thought maybe there was a cycle where if you pick it up this time it's in French, but if you pick it up again it would be in English. That went on for maybe an hour and then finally I saw that there was a button you could push for English. So we landed at Dorval and our hotel was at Mirabel because the agent didn't realize that there were two international airports in Montreal. "We realized just how vast this country

is when we got into the aircraft and I asked the flight attendant-in South Africa we the flight attendant—in South Africa we can fly across the whole country in two hours—how long it would be to our next stop and she replied, 'Oh, another four and a half hours.' I was shocked and thought four and a half hours in one country was crazy. I remember landing in Regina with wheat fields along the highway and I remember thinking we were going to be safe."

#### First impressions of Canada

Van der Merwe says he immediately felt at home in Canada.
"I thought this may as well be a farming

in South Africa because community it's exactly the same, the people are the same and just as friendly—it was the same except for the language. I thought that was so cool and things were smooth because I remember getting off the aircraft in Montreal and I had to go through immigration. All of my paperwork was there and when I got off, everything was there and when I got off, everything was there, they knew where we were going and what we were here for. Since it was so easy, I had a really good impression."

#### Interested in medicine

Van der Merwe jokes that he got into medicine because he wanted to know what was behind the "Authorized Personnel Only" doors

"The sign that says Authorized People Only, I wanted to know what makes you authorized. In the Operating Rooms you always see Authorized People Only and I always thought about what it means, and the answer was go to medical school for seven years and then we'll let you through. Truly that was it, I wanted to know what was through those doors.

#### **Family Physician** of the Year

Van der Merwe says his colleagues nominated him for the award.

# **Local resident pitches** youth centre to Chamber

Shellie Silverthorn was at the Sept. 10 Moosomin Chamber of Commerce meeting to present her business

Chamber of Commerce meeting to present her business idea of creating a youth centre.

"I have created a business idea, it's called The Hideout," Silverthorn explained. "It's designed for children and families—specifically teens—where they can come together. They can be themselves, they can be teens, and they can enjoy time together as well."

The proposed teen centre would feature after school to evening activities, including a central area where Silverthorn envisions an arcade atmosphere.

thorn envisions an arcade atmosphere.

"They can just go there, hang out with their friends, just enjoy their time together without feeling that they have to be cruising around town, biking around town, and just want to be safe," she said. "In the main area, there will be arcade games for tokens. So then that way kids can come in play as you go, but buy packages as well"

Other aspects of the centre would also allow youth to deal with stressful situations in a healthy way.

"Another part of that will be the rage room," Silverthorn said. "I find that with a lot of our youth, we have a lot of anxiety and depression—times that they feel alone

and times that they need an outreach."

The rage room would utilize an exercise Silverthorn has facilitated with her own teens involving writing down any anxieties on a dinner plate, then smashing the item—and all the negative feelings associated with the

"It is one of the best releases that you can have in a a controlled setting where you don't feel like you're going to hurt anyone, where you don't feel like anybody's judging you," Silverthorn said. "This is their space."

The centre could also be a gathering place for younger children and their caregivers, allowing for the adults to enjoy fellowship and coffee while the children play in a

safe environment.

One question from the floor was if the facility would be staffed, which Silverthorn confirmed it would be. She also noted potential staff would be required to possess certain training and clearances associated with centres

certain training and clearances associated with centres that engage youth.

What Silverthorn is looking for help with is procuring the physical space for the centre to call home, whether that be on a rental basis or purchasing property.

Chamber president Kevin Weedmark suggested Silverthorn meet with the Economic Development Committee and EDO Casey McCormac for a closer look at the neutral page. the youth centre plans.

# Town to pave alley by thrift store parking lot

parking lot and decided to pave the portion of alley running east-west next to the thrift store parking lot. The paving will be done for \$15,400.

The town also passed a motion to hire Action Asphalt to do some crack sealing for \$5,000, primarily on Wright

Access to property

At their last meeting, council received a letter from Garnet and Helen Fawcett requesting that the town develop Bertram Street so that property owned by the Fawcetts west of Heritage Place can be accessed. Ber-tram Street is an undeveloped street directly south of their land, and the Fawcetts are planning to either develop or sell that land. At their meeting on Wednesday, council passed a motion to do some work on the street in order to make the land accessible to the Fawcetts.

#### Conference call to be planned regarding eco centre

Council decided to set up a conference call with the askatchewan Association for Resource Recovery Corp (SARRC) to discuss putting a used oil facility at the town landfill. SAARC has approached the town about setting up the facility, however the town has been hesitant to enter into an agreement with SARRC due to the amount of liability for the town, and the cost for the town to permit and maintain the eco centre.

On Wednesday councillor Murray Gray pointed out

that if the town does not set up an eco centre, used oil could end up being disposed of in the town landfill.

It was decided a conference call was in order with SAARC to clear up some of the town's concerns.

#### Update on Bradley Park, **Parks and Rec Awards**

Moosomin Rec Director Mike Schwean reported to council that the Fun Zone area at Bradley Park is nearly complete. The area consists of a beach volleyball court, horseshoe pits, a disc golf course, a croquet course, a putting green, driving nets and chipping nets. He also told council that over the summer there have

been five to six campers using the campsites at Bradley Park at all times, making for consistent camping a the

### EDO talks about signage for lots, recovery centre, housing

incentive question

In her report to council, Moosomin Economic Development Officer Casey McCormac reported that she is getting signage made for all of the eligible lots where residential property can be built in town, as part of the town's \$30,000 housing incentive.

She also said that another proposal for an addictions recovery centre in Moosomin will be submitted to the provincial government by September 30, as the government has a new intake for proposals with a deadline of September 30.

McCormac also told council that Fieldstone Estates, a housing development located in the RM of Moosomin, had asked if there was any way to be included in the town's \$30,000 housing incentive, however the grant that the town received stipulates that it is only for properties within the town of Moosomin.

#### Presentation on starting a Lions club

Rob Hill made a presentation to council about starting a Lions Club in Moosomin. Hill, who lives in Maryfield, is a global extension team co-ordinator for the Lions

and said his job is to go to different communities and extend Lions Clubs into the communities.

Hill said they would need at least 20 people to sign up in order to start a club in Moosomin, and that Lions Clubs try to work with other service clubs in towns, such as the Kinsmen, Shriners, Knights of Columbus,

He said the benefit of having a club in Moosomin is the ability to access grants through the Lions ranging from \$10,000 to \$100,000 US for things like accessible playgrounds and disaster relief.

He left information with the town council for anyone interested in becoming a charter member.

Pickard explained. "So we may as well cut that one at the same time. I'm still waiting on some quotes for the stump removal, and there's a lot big lilac bush that needs to be removed as well."

Mac's Tree Removal will perform the removal work, a company the town has worked with previously.

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## Has Rourke resumed role as CFL's best OB?

When Nathan Rourke returned to the Canadian Football League after two years of trying to make his mark in the National Football League, was he automatically the CFL's No. 1 quarterback?

Not necessarily, even though most CFL fans expected him to pick up where he left off in 2022, a season in which he was named the league's most outstanding Canadian and led the B.C. Lions to a 12-6 record and a spot in the

and led the B.C. Lions to a 12-6 record and a spot in the Western Conference final,
Rourke's 2022 stats were amazing. In 10 games, he threw for 335 yards per game, tossed 25 touchdown passes and had only 10 interceptions. He got little more than a quick look with three NFL teams before he realized the NFL grass isn't necessarily greener, although the money certainly was. He earned more than \$500,000 while servine on yearing teams, are the services.

ing on various teams' practice rosters.
Upon his return to B.C., his numbers were only so-so in his first four games: four TD passes, seven interceptions and a 2-2 record.

The Lions now have two highly-paid quarterbacks: Rourke and veteran Vernon Adams, who hurt his knee in Week 9 but is now back. With Rourke and Adams—that expensive duo is unlikely to stay together in B.C.—the Lions have undoubtedly the best 1-2 QB combination in the

The Blue Bombers' duo of Zach Collaros and Chris Streveler would rank as the second-best QB pair while close behind in a one-two punch ranking would be Edmonton's McLeod Bethel-Thompson and Tre Ford. Every other team in the league has one fairly solid quarterback.

Individually, Cody Fajardo of the Grey Cup champion Montreal Alouettes would rank behind Collaros and Rourke, while the rest of the CFL QBs might follow in this order: Trevor Harris of Saskatchewan; Bo Levi Mitchell of Hamilton; Jake Maier of Calgary, Cameron Dukes of

Toronto and Dru Brown ion Ottawa.

## **Rural and Remote Health Minister speaks at Chamber meeting**

# Minister sees a path forward for Moosomin CT scanner

Tim McLeod, the Saskatchewan Minister of Rural and Remote Health, was invited to speak at the Moosomin Chamber of Commerce meeting on Tuesday. MacLeod also spoke about finding a path forward for a CT scanner

in Mossomin.

He opened his time at the podium by wishing his colleague, Steven Bonk, well in his future political endeav-

league, steven bonk, well in his future political endeavours.

"First and foremost, I want to acknowledge current MLA and your next Member of Parliament, Steven Bonk," McLeod said. "Steven and I were seat mates last year, and I'll tell you, I wasn't done learning from Steven yet, so I'm a little bit disappointed that he's leaving us at the provincial level, but he's certainly going to do a fantastic job for Souris-Moose Mountain at the federal level."

McLeod was quick to highlight some of the achieve-ments Moosomin has made in recent years, pointing to having a strong complement of 14 physicians in the community. He also acknowledged the medical residency training program that was added to Moosomin in 2021, and mentioned the Rural Physician Incentive Program increasing to \$200,000 over five years.

"Your provincial government is providing valuable tools to help Moosomin continue to recruit, train, incentivize and retain physicians for years to come." McLeod said. "Moosomin has also seen success with other healthsaid. "Moosomin has also seen success with other health-care staffing since we initiated the Health Human Re-sources Action Plan, which was first announced in the fall of 2022—two RNs, a CLXT and two MRTs have been successfully recruited to Moosomin as a result of that program. I was also pleased to see that the Moosomin Airport upgrade project is underway, which when com-pleted, will support access for the air ambulance—anoth-er critical piece to our healthcare system."

#### **Commitment to CT scanner**

The biggest topic McLeod was anticipated to broach was that of a CT scanner coming to Moosomin. Back in March, McLeod said that the government had found a path forward for a local CT scanner, but details needed to be ironed out.

io be ironed out.

"We're excited to continue to work together with the community," McLeod told the World-Spectator moments before the Chamber meeting. "I know on Budget Day last spring, we were excited to be able to say that we're committed to finding a path forward for the community, because this is something that has certainly been on the radar for some time, and that's certainly something I'm happy to talk to the community about here today."

McLeod explained that what makes the plan for Moosomin unique is that the proposal falls outside of current Saskatchewan Health Authority policy, requiring the de-

Saskatchewan Health Authority policy, requiring the development of a supplemental policy that would be viable for Moosomin, but could be used for similar proposals that may come forward from other communities in the

future.
"Determining what is possible in Moosomin is an important consideration," McLeod told those gathered at the Chamber meeting. "I understand that there may be a desire to have a CT scanner located within the hospital, the challenge would be finding space that works. The SHA has advised that there's currently no unused space in the hospital. They've also advised that, on a technical level, the current ultrasound room is not large enough to accompodate a CT scanner They've also advised that to accommodate a CT scanner. They've also advised that a formal assessment is required in order to determine whether usable space may exist and what significant renovations may be required to accommodate that. I also understand that representatives of the community had preliminary conversations with Prairie Sky Medical Imaging to clarify how privately-operated medical imaging providers operate in the current system."

With a private model, the provider would need to determine whether or not a sufficient business case would exist where privately-operated medical imaging providers. to accommodate a CT scanner. They've also advised that

exist, where privately-operated medical imaging providers are required to provide one free scan to the healthcare

system for each one done privately.

"Privately-operated medical imaging providers may have contracts with the SHA to provide scans to the SHA outside the two for one system, if the SHA determines that they need that for their capacity," McLeod further explained, adding that the private operators typically do not offer emergency scans and usually operate during

not offer emergency scans and usually operate during daytime hours. What McLeod does see as a greater challenge is that of staffing. Medical Radiation Technologists are in high demand throughout the healthcare system nationwide right now, and are difficult to recruit. "We appreciate the community's offer to contribute to the training on the healthcare side, we need to be mindful that this challenge extends beyond Moosomin and needs to be viewed in the big picture across the board," McLeod said. "The ability to staff a CT scanner in any rural community—whether it is Moosomin or any other community—whether it is more or and the community—whether it is more o munity—whether it is Moosomin or any other community that may come after—is our greatest concern. We are actively exploring potential solutions to address this issue with broader solutions that we have not yet fully fleshed out or otherwise confirmed to be viable

Mayor Larry Tomlinson asked McLeod what kind of timeline would be available in order to move ahead on

timeline would be available in order to move ahead on the CT scanner project.

"Anything that's been asked of us, we've done," he said, pointing to strides made locally through recruiting and financial commitments.

"I can't give you a firm timeline, unfortunately, but I think if we put our heads together, we can find that path," he said.

Another question and

Another question referenced wait times of three to four months for a CT scan, wondering if long wait times translate to a greater overall need.

"If you've got a few individuals who are waiting be-

cause they're going to the next nearest community, the

wait times at each of those communities is different, right? wait times at each of those communities is different, right? The wait time in Moose Jaw is going to be different than the wait time in Yorkton, and it's going to be different than the wait time in Regina," answered McLeod. "The SHA and the providers are trying to load level where possible, but some patients—for whatever reason—maybe they can't make it to the next nearest community. More the try implications and then't deather wait. Maybe they simply choose not to, and they'd rather wait on the list for their preferred location. There's a variety of factors that we have to look at, and you can't look at any isolated single case to make that determination."

McLeod confirmed that load levels at each site are being monitored and capacities are being met.

"The two-for-one system has been incredibly success-

"The two-for-one system has been incredibly successful to those that want to speed up their timeline and get through the system faster, that option is there for those that can afford it as well," he said.

Sparse staff also contributes to those long wait times. "Adding another CT scanner that needs to be staffed kind of spreads that shortage further," explained Assistant Deputy Health Minister Ingrid Kirby. "So that's one of our challenges here is staffing, It's not the fact that we need more equipment—that we need more physical CTs—it's the staffing that's challenging."

Last year, the province added 550 post-secondary training seats across 18 health programs (including MRT), but Kirby noted there will be a wait for the next batch of grads to formally hit the workforce.

grads to formally hit the workforce.
"We did increase the number of training seats for MRTs,

unfortunately, the regulator also increased the length of training, they added six more months to it," she said.

training, theý added šix more months to it," she saíd. The program at Saskatoon-based Saskatchewan Polytechnic begins in September and runs for 96 weeks. Applications for the two-year program open on Oct. 1 then close on Feb. 15, and students can expect a total base tuition of just over \$28,000. A career in general radiology can also lead to specializing in certain fields such as computerized tomography, mammography or angiography. "It's a designation that's used a lot in the health system in a lot of really key critical areas," Kirly explained. "Even with the numbers we've added for training, it's still not enough to meet our current need level."

#### **Next steps for Moosomin**

Given the unique situation Moosomin finds itself in, the question of where to go from here was asked. Chamber president Kevin Weedmark asked how a supplemental policy reflecting that uniqueness could be drafted. To illustrate his point, Weedmark pointed to facts such as the high number of doctors in town (the highest number per capita in the province), Moosomin being the only community of 3,000 in Canada where a medical residency can be done, and being the smallest centre in Saskatchewan to offer oncology.

"We think that we're unique in all these ways, and is there some way that can be reflected in this supplemental policy?" Weedmark asked.

In his reply, McLeod noted the importance of crafting policy reflecting the specific needs of Moosomin and surrounding areas.

"I would say Keyin, exactly for those reasons, is why

we're working with the community and why we want to work with the community so that we aren't creating a policy outside of your needs and what this community can offer," he said. # Town to purchase portable speed signs

In an update to a concern originally
brought forward last month, Kipling
Town Council further discussed the
question of how to curb speeding on 4th
Street during their regular meeting on
Sept 9

Sept. 9.
Councillor Devin Draper presented the concern as neighbours noticed an increase in speeding motorists particularly between the 200 and 400 blocks of 4th between the 200 and 400 blocks of 4th Street. Town staff had investigated one possible remedy Draper proposed, that of portable speed bumps, which could also be funded through an SGI traffic safety fund grant. Instead of the temporary speed bumps proposed, the area would actually require speed humps, which are much wider and more costly. "Those were \$1,500 per hump, and you would need four of them to do two locations," Acting Administrator Andrew Rygh said. "You would put two on the street because you need to have it allow for water drainage."

for water drainage."

The cost of four permanent speed humps would come to around \$6,000,

and could complicate snow removal in the area they are placed.

Discussion then turned to speed signs as a deterrent, which could also collect data while reminding fast drivers to slow

"You can move them from place to place, and the discussion was had that if we got radar signs, we could actually monitor the speed in a number of differ-ent locations, collect data on it, and then once that data is collected, then we can determine whether we need to move to next steps," said Rygh. "The hope is that the radar signs will help suppress the

speed in locations."

Council made a motion to move forward with the purchase of portable speed signs, contingent on total project funding through the SGI traffic safety fund.

#### Paving work completed

Kipling residents may have noticed in-creased paving activity recently as Southwest Paving came to town a few weeks

ago.

A large portion of their activity was patch work due to regular wear and tear, plus water main breaks, but they also repaved a few blocks as well.

"They did one block of 8th Avenue, one

block of 3rd Street, and then one block of 3rd Avenue, and then patchwork," Rygh explained. "A number of residents benefited from having Southwest Paving in town, and they took the opportunity to get their driveways either resurfaced or paved."

The cost for all the paving work comes to \$250,000, which budgeted for the

**Signage and visibility**In his Acting Administrator's report,
Rygh updated Council on several items of interest. Firstly, signage for the Curling Club and Arena is ready and has been de-

The town is still waiting on replacing the crosswalk sign at the intersection of 6th Avenue and Railway Street. Responsibility for replacing the crosswalk sign falls on the provincial Department of Highways, who Rygh noted has been notified of the issue.

"We have been in touch with them quite regularly to get our crosswalk sign replaced, and we keep being told that it's

replaced, and we keep being told that it's going to be looked after, but it's been a number of months now," Rygh said.

One block over on the corner of 7th Avenue and Railway Street, hedges have been blocking line of sight for motorists. The hedge trimming item had been brought to Council's attention last month, and Rygh was pleased to report a positive outcome thus far.

"That's gone well, and we're going to assess the progress this week," he said.

#### Ball park shelter almost complete

Work on a shelter at the ball diamonds is 95 per cent complete according to Rygh. The only real work right now is deciding on serving doors—either go ahead with the current design, or go with a new aluminum roll-up style.

"The ones that were put in place will require a little bit of work to make them functional, and there's discussion of whether or not we abandon that style and move to an aluminum roll up door,"

Rygh said.
A space was also created for an air conditioning unit in the cooler room, which will be installed after winter.

"We'll pull it out, we'll keep it probably in storage at the arena, and then put it in place next spring, when we get started

with that season," Rygh said.

#### Ash trees safe

After a Dutch elm disease survey was onducted on local spruce trees in July, the suggestion of an ash tree assessment came to the town, citing concerns of the emerald ash borer beetle. Fortunately, the tree studies noted neither Dutch elm dis-ease nor the beetle prevalent in Kipling. However, there is one issue still facing a few trees in town.

"Zero evidence of emerald ash borer was found, so our trees are safe," Rygh said. "They did note that they saw some frost cracks and mechanical damage that we might want to monitor."

Frost cracks can cause damage and compromise the strength of affected trees, making them less likely to with-

stand high winds.

"Depending on the wind, what kind of force it puts on, it can actually torque the tree and tear it right down," Rygh said.

#### Seasonal wifi

An item from the Foreman's Report noted the need for wifi at the arena, but it will travel during the off season. A pair of installations will be made—one at the arena and another at the pool—only used when the season dictates.

when the season dictates.
"We'll disconnect it at the arena and save the six months worth of cost, and then disconnect it at the pool and save that so really, we're paying for one connection, and there is minimal extra cost for the setup," Rygh explained, citing the price tag as being \$60.

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## More than \$16.8 million to be invested in rural roads

On Thursday, the Government of Sas-katchewan and Saskatchewan Asso-ciation of Rural Municipalities (SARM) announced more than \$16.8 million of investment for 13 rural road projects, which will help producers ship goods more efficiently and support the province's export-based economy.

Under the Rural Integrated Roads for Growth (RIRG) program, the Ministry of Highways will invest more than \$5.3 million toward the projects and rural mu-nicipalities (RMs) will fund the remaining \$11.5 million this construction season.

The RM of Hazelwood No. 94 is one

of those RMs. Hazelwood will receive \$500,000 under the RIRG program. The RM will contribute \$530,390, for a total project cost of \$1,030,390.

The RM of Elcapo No. 154 will also be

receiving funding under the program. El-capo will receive \$279,326 under the program, and will spend \$279,327 for a total project cost of \$558,653.

"These investments recognize the im-

portant role our rural municipal roads play in Saskatchewan's strong and growing export-based economy," Highways Minister Lori Carr said. "They are part of an integrated transportation network that supports our local industries, rural com-munities and enhances our province's quality of life."

"SARM is pleased to see these projects receive funding assistance," SARM Act-ing President Bill Huber said. "Rural Saskatchewan has significant transportation infrastructure needs. Many of the goods and resources the province exports originate in our rural municipalities. Improving RM roads pays major economic returns to all of Saskatchewan. SARM looks forward to continued partnership with the Ministry of Highways to administer the Rural Integrated Roads for Growth Program into



Projects this year range from clay capping, base and sub-base work, grading and

surface strengthening.

"The RIRG Grant underscores provincial commitment to improving rural road in-frastructure," RM of Eldon No. 471 Reeve Larry Lundquist said. "Funding from this program greatly assists our municipality in managing our most important infra-

structure asset—our high-traffic roads."

Administered by SARM, the provincially-funded RIRG program invests in constructing and upgrading RM road infrastructure. RIRG funding is up to 50 per cent per project to a maximum of \$500,000 for a road and to a maximum \$1 million for a large culvert or bridge. RMs fund the remaining project costs.

RIRG oversight is provided by a Program Management Board made up of members from SARM and the Ministry of Highways

The Government of Saskatchewan has invested more than \$13 billion in transportation infrastructure since 2008 to improve more than 20,700 kilometres of highways across the province.




