Jerney Desjarlais modeling overseas at Paris Indigenous Fashion Week

Jerney Desjarlais of Rocanville selected to be a part of Indigenous Fashion Week in Paris coming up at the end of September. Desjarlais is a Métis model and is excited for the opportunity to model in Paris.

Desjarlais says she lived in Rocanville until she was 12 years old before moving to B.C.

"I am a 15-year-old model, and I am currently living in British Columbia in the lower mainland, in Coquitlam," she says

she says.
"I was born and raised in Saskatchewan. I lived in Rocanville for the first 12 years of my life. The first time I ever modelled was when I was eight months old. My mom signed me up for a model shoot. Then, we moved to B.C. and I have always been interested in fashion so I thought, 'Oh yea, I want to get into modelling,' and my mom was 100 per cent on board with that.

"She started school at Blanche Macdonald in Vancouver and students there will model for their class and so I thought I could be the models for them, so that is when I really started."

She says there are some challenges that come with modelling.

"The quick changes that happen, like last minute changes in schedules. That is probably one of the most stressful things I have gone through."

Desjarlais models at the Blanche Macdonald School of arts, fashion, and make-up in Vancouver.

"From my second runway I was asked to be a part of an agency," she said. "Even though I don't think I have done a lot of modelling, when I add all of it up I have definitely done a lot.

"I modelled in Kamloops for a fashion show for the elders, and I have modelled for IKR (International Kids Runway) which was my first-ever runway. The main thing that I do is model for students at Blanche Macdonald."

She says she is beyond excited to go to Paris for Indigenous Fashion Week.

"Kim Coltman, the founder of Indigenous Fashion Week, looked at the list of applications and thought which ones would work. I was ecstatic when I found out I was chosen. I was so excited and to be honest it was a huge shock. I have come very far in modelling."

Desjarlais will be going to Paris with her mom and younger sister.

"Indigenous Fashion Week in Paris is for about a week. We leave on September 22. I am very excited for the trip and the event," she says. "I hope it opens more doors in the world of fashion and I believe that it will. I am most excited to tour Paris and see the sites and the actual experience of the fashion show. My mom and my younger sister are coming with me too. My mom and I have a really good relationship, so I am excited she is coming."

Desjarlais is enjoying modelling for right now, but sees her future working in a different profession. "I don't see myself going that far in modelling if I am

"I don't see myself going that far in modelling if I am being honest. When people ask me, 'Do you plan on doing modelling as your actual job?' I always say, 'No.' I do plan on taking a break from modelling after my two-year contract is up, which just started. I would like to focus more on school after my contract and I see myself going into law in the future instead of modelling."

Jerney's mother Ruth will be responsible for makeup at the event in Paris, and her sister Echo will be a backstage Production Assistant and dresser for the show

"I'm responsible for all eight models, and then sometimes if the staff don't have time to do it themselves, then I'm lucky enough to do their makeup too," says Ruth. "It's very, very cool and it's kind of weird because I wanted to be in Indigenous fashion right off the bat but it didn't happen. Then Jerney became involved and she got me involved. So it's really, really strange how that happened. I guess that's the way that it was supposed to be, through her."

All eight models at the show will be Canadian. The show takes place at the Canadian Ambassadors Residence in Paris on September 27.

"It's a lot of work and a lot of people underestimate."

"It's a lot of work and a lot of people underestimate what goes into fashion shows," says Ruth. "It can be quite overwhelming actually, especially runway because there are a lot of quick changes between the shows and there's a lot of pressure. So there's probably about four days of preparing and rehearsal because they have to practice as a team."

According to Kim Coltman, the Co-Founder of Fashion Speaks International, "Indigenous fashion is the fastest growing segment of the fashion industry. It is now providing equitable opportunities and access to Indigenous creators and youth."

Ruth says the growth of Indigenous representation in fashion is an important step for the industry to take.

"Indigenous fashion is important because it's Indig-

"Indigenous fashion is important because it's Indigenous designers creating the designs to represent what Indigenous fashion looks like or should look like, and not what we've seen showcased in the past," she says.

"It's time to bring Indigenous designers, Indigenous models and anything Indig-enous to the forefront. I think it's really, really important to show our youth that the sky is the limit and I think it's just important to put that culture front and forward. It's important and I think it's really cool that they do Paris Fashion Week as well as Paris Indigenous Fashion Week. One of the girls that Jerney met at the Interna-tional Kids Runway—she and another Indigenous designer are actually taking part in Paris Fashion Week as well as Paris In-digenous Fashion Week. I think one of the coolest things is that they're bringing Paris Indigenous Fashion Week to the forefront and they're not taking it and separating it, there are also Indigenous models and de-signers in Paris Fashion Week. It's just that in Paris Indigenous Fashion Week, they're taking that and really focusing on it as a highlight. So I think that's really cool." Ruth says she thinks interesting that Jer-

ney's first model photo showed up in the World-Spectator when Jerney was just a

"When she was eight months old we were asked if her picture could be used for photographer Kirsten Franson's mar-keting—she had little business cards. She asked if she could put Jerney's picture on her business card and advertise it in The World-Spectator, and so at the time you're flattered because you think that you must have a cute baby but you're not thinking about the future at all.

"When she started getting a little bit old-er, she did a little bit of modeling for Lindsay Weimer Photography. She did that for a little while at about six years old. Then when we moved to B.C. she started really taking it more seriously.

"I just think it's so cool that The World-

Spectator is where she got started. If you go back to the 2009 Winter Fun Guide, on go back to the 2009 winter run Guide, on the front page was a little snowman face and then you open it and Jerney is on the top left and it's an ad for Franson's Pho-tography when she's a little baby with these little angel wings. Town to help cover cost of internet at medical clinic

LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER At last week's regular meeting of Council on Sept. 18, Rocanville town council

made the decision to cover the costs of internet services at the medical clinic in Rocanville

"We've decided that, yes, we will install and help fund the internet to keep our doctors in town," said Administrator Tan-ya Strandlund. "It's an important service

to this community, and we need to help support it."

To install the RFNOW fibre internet, there's an estimated cost of \$800 and from there, exact numbers are not completely firmed up yet, however the commitment

firmed up yet, however the commitment is strong.

"I don't know exactly how it's going to look right now in regards to how we help fund them, because their increased internet is a higher cost to the clinic," Strandlund explained. "So I'm not sure how it's going to look exactly yet regarding how we're going to help support that, but as of right now, yes, we are on board for it. The town and the RM own the building, and that's why we are going to be installed.



Virden RCMP traffic stop leads to seizure of drugs

Charges laid against Thomas Olson

On September 13 at approximately 9:50 pm, Virden RCMP officers conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle located on Nelson Street in Virden.

An officer approached the vehicle, with

An officer approached the vehicle, with a single occupant, and spoke with the driver, identified as a 43-year-old male from the RM of Wallace-Woodworth.

During the conversation with the driver, the officer observed illicit tobacco on the front passenger seat. The driver was immediately placed under arrest and secured in the police vehicle.

A search of the driver and vehicle led to the seizure of 8 grams of crystal methamphetamine, 202 grams of cocaine, over \$1,000 in cash and other drug-related paraphernalia.

RCMP have charged 43-year-old Thomas Olson with possession for the purpose of trafficking, possession of property obtained by crime and for possession of unmarked tobacco contrary to the tax administration and Miscellaneous Taxes Act. He was remanded into custody. Virden RCMP continue to investigate.

Vehicle stolen in Virden

On September 9, RCMP received a report that a vehicle was stolen from a residence in the town of Virden. The vehicle has since been recovered and the incident is under investigation.

Arrested for illicit drugs and tobacco

On September 14, during a routine traffic patrol in the town of Virden, RCMP conducted a traffic stop to check sobriety and license validity. Illicit tobacco was in plain sight. The driver was arrested for possession of the illicit tobacco and a search of the vehicle revealed numerous illicit drug paraphernalia and drugs. The male was charged with adult possession for the purpose of trafficking—Schedule I: cocaine, adult possession for the purpose of trafficking—Schedule I: methamphetamine (crystal meth), adult possess fewer than 25 units of unmarked tobacco contrary to section 3.1 or 3.3 of the Tobacco Tax Act, adult possession of property obtained by crime less than or equal \$5,000. He will appear before the court in October.

\$325 speeding fine

On September 14, during a routine traffic patrol in the RM of Sifton, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 131 km/hr in a 110 km/hr zone. A traffic stop was conducted and the driver was issued a traffic offence notice for speeding, which carries a fine of \$325.



Canadian flags will be flapping all over Montreal this week as 24 of the world's best golfers descend on Royal Montreal Golf Club for the President's Cup.

Not only is our country represented by its hosting site, but the President's Cup captain is Canadian Mike Weir, who has good memories of this event when it was held at this same location back in 2007. In Sunday singles that year, Weir defeated Tiger Woods, eliciting nationwide eurobesis, but Weir's International cound citil lost the centre. phoria, but Weir's International squad still lost the com-

In fact, winning the competition has been almost im-possible for the Internationals. In 14 biennial competi-tions, the U.S. has won 12 times, losing only once and ty-ing once. An International victory in Montreal this week would be one of the biggest upsets — and stories — of the year on our soil.

Taking up three of the International team's 12-golfer roster spots are Canadians Taylor Pendrith, Corey Conners and Mackenzie Hughes. Conners is ranked 28th in the Official World Golf ranking while Pendrith is 34th. Two other Canadians — Adam Hadwin and Nick Taylor — are ahead of Hughes in the world rankings, but captain Weir selected Hughes instead. His short-game prowess can be a powerful tool in match play, and the International squad will need every bit of around-the-green magic to keep pace with the powerful Americans.

Prior to 1994, the only major international golf event was the esteemed Ryder Cup, a competition between the United States and Europe that had been held every two years since 1927. On Friday, September 6, fourteen members of the local Moosomin Chapter of the STS toured the JGL Shepherd

Moosomin Chapter of the S15 toured the JGL Shepherd hops farm operation near Moosomin.

The group had a tour in June of this year and decided that a harvest tour was a must. What an impressive operation! Very labor intensive but a labor of love for those involved. Those working the operation had a dream and their dream is now a reality. It's never too late to learn something new and that is exactly our goal as retired teachers.

The spring tour allowed us to see the hops at a young stage, learning about how they are trained by hand to climb the coconut ropes. As Terry Lynd told us, "The vines must be trained to curl around the vines in a clockwise rotation to follow the sun."

Guy Shepherd walked the group through the entire operation in June, discussing the planting, training, harvesting, and marketing of the hops that are then used to brew some of the best beer in Saskatchewan and Manitoba. We learned about the harvesting, drying, baling, pelleting, fertilizing, and packaging, as well as a whole mix of information that comes into the success of the operation.

The September tour allowed us to see the harvesting process firsthand. We watched as they cut down and captured the vines using truck and tractor. We then saw

captured the vines using truck and tractor. We then saw the harvester at work, separating the hops from the vine and sending them into the dryer via a conveyor belt. From the field we went to Skout Brewing in Moosomin for our meeting and sampled the product firsthand! Delicious! Back in June, we also had an opportunity to tour the brewery and learn firsthand how the brewmaster works his magic. This was a wonderful opportunity for our group and we would highly recommend it to everyone

Many thanks to JGL Shepherd Farms for hosting us at the farm and to Skout Brewing for providing an inviting location for a meeting in June and again in September. Following our tour of the farm, the Moosomin Chapter of the STS met to discuss a variety of subjects—the

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

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
