

The goal of Occupational Therapy

The goal of occupational therapy is to yourself is important to achieve such help people do what they want or need to do. Occupational therapists (OTs) focus on how a person is doing with everyday, meaningful activities. Physical, cognitive, emotional, spiritual, social, and environmental factors are considered.

Abilities are built upon and barriers are broken down in each of these areas to help a person function. It is a clientcentred, holistic, and evidence-based profession.

OTs work in numerous settings, such as in the home and community, hospitals, long-term care centres, schools, insurance, counselling centres, corrections, government, and private clinics. The following are some examples of how an OT can help:

1. Physical

If you have decreased hand function from a brain injury, delayed fine motor skills, sensory sensitivities, or decreased hand eye co-ordination, an OT can help you rehabilitate or learn strategies so that you can still chop vegetables, write, participate in the classroom, and drive. Practice in various ways and pacing

goals.

2. Cognitive

If you are noticing some changes to your memory, planning, and problemsolving skills, a cognitive assessment can be helpful in providing more information. It can be used to bring awareness and track changes. OTs can assess this area and provide recommendations. Creating a routine, making consistent organized notes, organizing your home, sleep, exercise, and keeping up with hobbies that get you thinking are important for maintaining cognitive skills

3. Emotional

If you are feeling mentally stuck and it is negatively impacting your mood, ability to provide self-care, sleep, run errands, engage in relationships, work, and so forth, mental health therapy would be beneficial. OTs can help you find yourself and your next steps through counselling. OTs can help you learn coping strategies, self-management skills, treat insomnia, and gain a different perspective.



4. Environmental

If it is getting difficult for you to mobilize where you want to go, enter your house, complete tub/ chair/ bed transfers, or if you have fallen at home, a home assessment focusing on accessibility would be beneficial. An OT can recommend equipment that would increase safety and independence in the

home. This equipment may include a wheelchair, bathroom equipment, or lifts

Reach out to your local occupational therapists if you aim to improve your functioning and wellness! Locally, there is typically one within the Saskatchewan Health Authority, School Division, and private options.

Hearing Clinic Q&A Things to know before going to a hearing clinic

What should I know before

going to a hearing clinic? Hearing clinics are to be licensed to operate in Saskatchewan by the Ministry of Health.

There are three types of clinicians who work at a hearing clinic:

Audiologist • Can perform all test batteries required by the Ministry of Health. · Can provide services for third party

insurance companies. • Need to maintain annual continuing education hours to maintain their license.

· Can provide services to anyone of any age.

Hearing Instrument Practitioner

Can perform all test batteries required by the Ministry of Health.
Can provide services for third party

insurance companies Need to maintain annual continu-

ing education hours to maintain their license

• Can provide services to anyone 18 years of age and older.

Student

• Able to see patients under the super-vision of an approved tutor.

You should try to make sure that your ears are free of debris and cerumen (wax) before coming to see a clinician at a hearing clinic. Some clinics offer cerumen removal services.

A medical background questionnaire will be asked; try to bring your medica-tions and health history with you (medical conditions can indicate issues hidden within the ear).

A hearing evaluation should be per-formed in a soundproof booth. If this is not possible, the ambient noise must be below a certain level to get an accurate evaluation.

How often should I get

my hearing checked? Your hearing should be re-evaluated every two years.

If you are exposed to excessive noise, Occupational Health and Safety indicates you must be wearing hearing pro-tection and test your hearing every two years, especially after an excessive noise incident.

If you experience sudden hearing

How much do hearing aids cost? This question varies from clinic to clin-

ic and product to product. A hearing evaluation is required to determine what type of hearing aid will work for you.

Can I use someone else's hearing aid?

Certain hearing aids are custom made for an individual's ear-these hearing aids cannot be used for someone else.

If you have a universal hearing aid it may be reprogrammed to another individual depending on the capabilities of the hearing aid and that person's hearing loss.Note: Warranty and services may

not be transferred to the new owner Cost of services may be required to

refit the hearing aid. Some clinics will not reprogram a hearing aid for others due to medical

The aring and to others due to incutat contamination concerns. Hearing aids have a lifespan. After supplies are no longer available, the hearing clinic may not be able to do any-thing with the hearing aid.

If your hearing clinic is willing to re-program hearing aids, they can find out how old the hearing aid is and if supplies are available from the serial number.

Mentoring and transition starts in the farm management buddy seat

Most modern farm equipment contains an extra seat, known as the buddy seat. This seat is often occupied by a child or teen riding along with their mom or dad, properly strapped in, and keenly interested in what's going on. Many of my fond childhood memories are riding in this seat beside my dad. Whether it is the intention or not, this is the beginning of the training program that will turn your kids into farm operators.

I remember vividly to this day the first time my dad switched seats with me and trusted me to drive the tractor and seeder, eventually leaving me to operate it on my own. The benefit of farming as a business is that it allows children many hours of own. The benefit of raming as a business is that it allows children many hours of observation time over many years. By the time they graduate from high school they have accumulated hundreds of ride-along hours, and in the process have learned im-portant skills. They may already be taking on important roles on the farm, operating equipment, handling livestock, etc. before they head off to college. This hands-on teaching method is very effective at transferring necessary skills. With a mere switching of seats, the learn-ing changes to mentorship and gives lots of opportunities for feedback and develop-ment over a long period of time. So how does the ride-along apply to farm management? The same principles can be used to develop a similar mentor-ship program to adequately train the next

ship program to adequately train the next generation in the areas of farm business management. Below are three points to help develop and fully utilize your farm



management buddy seat

1. Bring them along If you expect your kids to take over the complete management of the farm busi-ness, they should be exposed as early as possible to areas of the farm business. Now I am not suggesting that you bring your eight-year-old to the meeting with your accountant, but if your kids are interested in taking over the business, they should certainly start to attend these meetings as soon as they are working on the farm full-time. The purpose is to begin expos-ing them to the business side of farming. This may seem simple enough, but there are many farms that I meet with where the kids have been working on the farm

for more than five years, want to take over the farm business, but have never seen the farm's financial statements.

2. Have a plan

Just as important as bringing them along is understanding a desirable outcome. For the next trade show you attend, go with a list of information you need to have before you leave. It may be a stop at your grain buyer to see if they are offering a show spe-cial for fall crop bookings or some informa-tion on a new piece of equipment. If you have a plan, it involves your kids in the discussion process and you get something

out of the time spent.

3. Bring them along no matter what Did I mention it was important to bring them along? A common excuse, especially them along? A common excuse, especially if the farm is struggling financially, is that you don't want your kids to know how bad things are. In the same way, your kids were alongside you in the field fighting the mud or combining in a drought, they need to be with you learning about the business no matter what. It helps them understand why design are mode and provide word why decisions are made and provides you with a different perspective on the prob-lem. If they are involved in solving the problem, they will be more determined in

making it work. Engaging in a formal farm transition plan, with the help of an advisor, can help establish realistic goals and milestones that everyone can agree on – and help with ac-countability. It may seem strange to begin with but taking the time to explain the importance of the business side of farm-ing to your kids, and utilizing your farm management buddy seat, will provide the best chance for your kids to succeed – and for you to have a long and successful re-tirement.



Three documents everyone should consider having

Ensuring that your wishes are known and respected, both during your lifetime and following your death, is an important aspect of any plan for the future. While you are alive and well, communicating your wishes and controlling decisions that affect you is fairly straightforward. In the event that you lose your ability to communicate or your capacity to make In the event that you lose your ability to communicate or your capacity to make decisions, things can get more compli-cated unless you have planned for such an event. And if you should die without properly setting out your wishes for your estate, you will lose all control over how it is handled. it is handled.

There are three different legal docu-ments that can help ensure that your wishes are known and honoured. It is important for individuals to understand what each document can and can't ac-complish.

HEALTH CARE DIRECTIVE

A health care directive lets others know your wishes concerning your health care treatment in the event that you lose your capacity to make or communicate such decisions. Generally speaking, a health care directive provides your doctor or other health care professional with directions about the types of medical treatment or measures that are acceptable to you. A health care directive can cover decisions health care directive can cover decisions regarding matters like diagnostic test-ing, blood transfusions, resuscitation, life support, feeding tubes, antibiotics, surgi-cal procedures and palliative or comfort measures. Health care directives can be completely personalized and need not be limited to the examples listed above.



They can also name a proxy that is autho-rized to make decisions on your behalf and in line with your known wishes. A health care directive cannot authorize eu-thanasia or assisted suicide.

ENDURING POWER OF ATTORNEY

An enduring power of attorney autho-rizes another person to act on your behalf and will continue in effect even if you later lose your legal capacity. It can be set up to deal with both your property mat-ters—such as banking, investments, leas-es or sales—as well as personal affairs,

such as where you will live and how your personal care needs will be met. It can also be designed to deal with only prop-erty matters or only personal matters. It is important to note, however, that

an enduring personal power of attorney, either on its own or in combination with either on its own or in combination with a property power of attorney, cannot authorize decisions concerning medical treatment—these decisions must be dealt with under a health care directive. An enduring power of attorney only applies during your lifetime and ceases to be ef-fective upon your death. WILL A will covers the distribution of your property or estate after you die. Properly dratted and executed, a will can help en-sure that your property is divided the way you intended and benefits the people you intended. It can be drafted very broadly (three equal shares to my three children) or contain very specific bequests (to my only brother, David, I leave my entire art collection). A will only comes into effect collection). A will only comes into effect upon your death and may be changed during your lifetime to reflect changes in your personal life, provided that you continue to be of sound mind.

A will can also be used as part of an overall estate plan to address matters concerning capital gains taxes, transfer-ring farm property or business shares, roll-overs and life interests. It also allows you to name your Executor, the person that will be responsible for seeing your wishes through, and provides an oppor-tunity to record and discuss your wishes about matters such as guardianship of your minor children or funeral arrangements

As you can see, these three documents deal with three very distinct areas of plan-ning for the future and cannot simply be used interchangeably. Together they can provide a good measure of security that your affairs are in order, regardless of what the future holds. As these docu-ments are local decuments, it is inport ments are legal documents, it is impor-tant to understand what is required in order for them to be effective.




